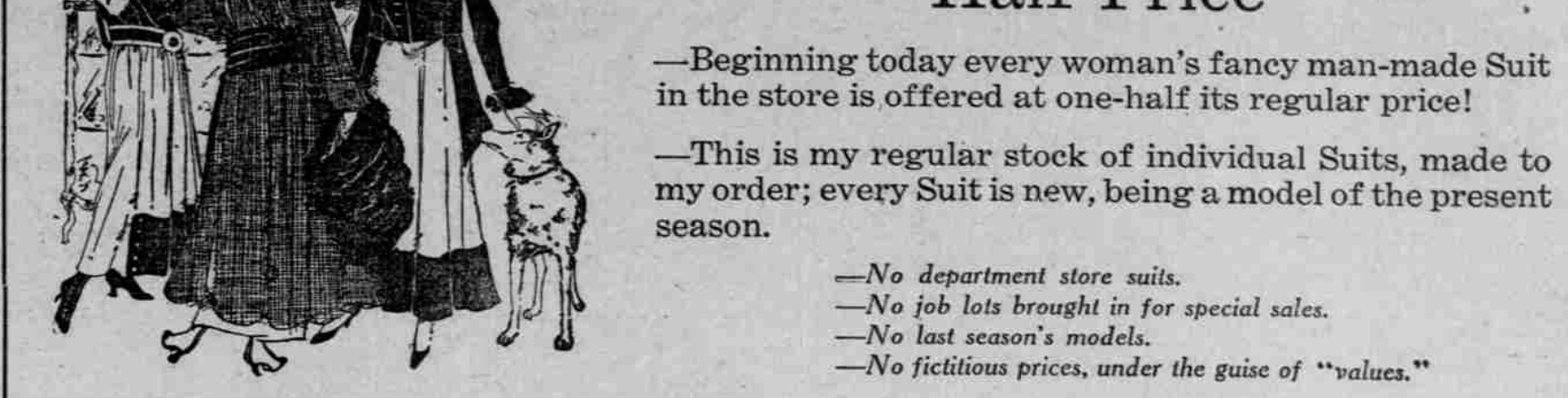

POSTMISTRESS TO PAY

AUSTIN EMBEZZLEMENT BRINGS FINE AND SENTENCE.

Amount Equal to That Used in Speculations Assessed—Guilty Plea Shields Someone in Hint.

Mrs. Mollie Irwin, formerly postmistress at Austin, Or., who pleaded guilty of embezzlement of \$150.41 of Government funds, was sentenced yesterday by Judge Beasly, of the United States District Court, to three months in the County Jail and a fine equal to the amount embezzled.

The plea of Mrs. Irwin's attorney for leniency was supplemented by one from Assistant United States District Attorney Johnson, who said that she evidently had not profited by the speculations, which were made in withholding funds received for the Government. Mr. Johnson inferred from his remarks that there may have been a man who was the beneficiary. He mentioned the fact that her former husband had left her to make her living by running a country postoffice, boarding-house and candy store.

Mrs. Irwin's attorney said that she had no safe in the postoffice, and that others besides herself had access to the place where the money was kept.
