"In the past eight years of work in organized charities there has never en before a condition where there were so many men with wives and familles reduced by unemployment and other unforseen circumstances to a condition of temporary destitution," is the expression of Secretary V. R. Manning, of the Associated Charities, upon the present situation.

This condition is not, Mr. Manning asserts, confined to Portland alone, but is evident here as it is in other sec-tions of the country and must be dealt with by such relief measures as can be used until an improvement of condi-tions removes the pressure.

"Organized charity will have to bear the burden of caring for these unfortunate people after the Christmas holidays and it is for this reason that the Associated Charities is making its earnest appeal for money for its relief fund," says Mr. Manning, "If citizens of Portland, even those in moderate circumstances, would all contribute from \$1 to \$2 the problem would be practically solved."

While the Associated Charities is carrying on its relief work every day, during the holiday week there is naturally relief in the pressure upon it, owing to the vast number of temporary Charity Must Bear Burden

The families in want. however, are not provided for for the whole year by the baskets and gifts they receive Christmas day, and it is to the Associated Charities that they turn in the remainder of the Winter.
