RENTAL OFFER REJECTED

With Activity in Grain Trade Increased, Shipping Is Expected and Lively Scramble for Business May Result.

With the arrival of the Columbia River yesterday the tug Goliath, of the Puget Sound Tugboat Company's fleet, that corporation is said to have thrown its board of directors into competition with the Port of Portland in towing ships in and out of the river.

The Puget Sound Tugboat Company offered to lease a tug to the Port of Portland, and it was considered briefly at the last meeting, but the board of directors previously to re-establish the pilot schooner Joseph Pullitzer off the bar, so that she could put pilots aboard for bar service.

In information conveyed to the Port of Portland Commission it was said the Puget Sound corporation's fleet was not busy these days, which accounts for the tug being available for bar service.

Rates were not openly cut by the opposition, yet it was reported that ships contracted for in advance at a 5 per cent reduction. The port has its rates at a low figure, \$1.50 a foot draft and 1 cent a ton net register.

The prevailing east wind is not assisting sailing vessels to the river, so mariners look for a cold snap and southerly winds blow. Then there will be a scramble between the two tug carriers. There was a six-mile easterly breeze on yesterday, and no new arrivals.

The British bark Oweene, grain-laden for the United Kingdom, towed to sea at 11:55 o'clock. There is a tug war between the crew and that of the British bark Crown of India, which towed to sea at 12:45 o'clock Friday.
