

WHEAT GOES HIGHER
Sales Are Made at 21-2-Cent
Advance on Exchange.

OFFERINGS ARE LIMITED
Buying of Barley and Oats for Export
to Europe Continues at
Improving Prices—Flour
Market is Firm.

Wheat went higher yesterday in the local and country markets. At the Merchants Exchange prices advanced 2 1/2 cents on actual sales and bid prices were higher all through the list. Sellers were strong and would let go of little.

Five thousand bushels of February club sold at \$1.25 a bushel, a gain of 2 1/2 cents over Saturday, and there was a similar advance in February red Russian, which closed at \$1.22 on a 3000-bushel sale.

Wheat exports break all records
Over 12,000,000 bushels shipped from United States and Canada in week.

The weekly wheat statistics of the Merchants Exchange show the following condition in the visible supply: Dec. 21, 1914, 41,702,000 bushels, decrease, 5,000; Dec. 22, 1914, 41,657,000, increase, 5,000; Dec. 23, 1914, 41,657,000, no change.

Wheat-Weather more favorable and wheat already being sown in many districts. The area will be greatly reduced. Stocks are fair and native offers generally small.

Germany-Weather is mild everywhere and the outlook for the new crop on the whole is reported as being satisfactory.

France-Weather is generally favorable and wheat already being sown in many districts.

Italy-Weather is generally favorable on an increased acreage. Market is very firm.

Roumania-Weather is very favorable start on a normal acreage. Offers are small and stocks likewise of wheat.

Hungary-Weather against crop. Acreage planted is small, and there is much wheat in the country.

India-Weather and crop prospects continue generally favorable. Wheat is not being offered in the market.

Argentina-Latest advices are of unfavorable weather. New wheat is being sown in large quantities.

All coast hop markets quiet
Buying Not Expected to Revive During Holiday Season.

No trading outlined down at all points on the coast yesterday. There is little or no demand in this state and dealers do not expect business to revive before the first of the month.

The New York market is inactive, according to the Waterbury-Trip Reporter, which says:

"We learn of no sales here or in the adjoining towns and little change in the present situation is looked for during the holidays. Offers at lower rates have been made, but growers have turned them down."

"The Chicago Brewers' Bulletin says: 'The demand for brewers is next to nothing for the time being. Dealers figure that the advance in the cost of malt will have the effect of stimulating the demand on the part of those brewers who have not yet bought their full requirements. However, there is a disposition among brewers to put off purchasing until after the first of the year.'"

General George Nicolas, at St. Gall, writes of the Swiss hop supply:

"Switzerland obtains its supply of hops from Austria, Bavaria, Wurttemberg, Baden, Saxony and Alsace-Lorraine. Communication with these countries has not been interfered with by the war, and as the crops were gathered without disturbance and in good condition, nothing prevents the Swiss growers this year from obtaining their normal stocks and at normal prices. The brewers of this state, however, are not large concerns, and would scarcely consider over-sea importations except in an emergency."

"One of the effects of the European conflict has been to reduce the consumption of beer in Switzerland as well as in the countries at war, and this will naturally be a proportionate falling off in the consumption of hops."

APPLES SELLING BETTER IN ENGLAND
Stronger Demand for Box Fruit Reported at Advancing Prices.

Conditions in the British apple markets are reported by W. Dennis & Sons, of London, as follows:

"The market on boxed apples is showing a great improvement, and we expect good Oregon Newwatts with some color will make up to 6s per box for the best counties. California Newwatts are also a much better trade, for which we can now make 1 1/2 times as much as for the last year. Prices we expect will be maintained unless supplies come in much larger quantities than we anticipate during the next few weeks."

"Some Oregon Newwatts with the best coloration at Liverpool, and sales were affected at from 6s 6d to 7s 6d, while the best counties of a car of extra fancy stock made 10s to 11s. California Newwatts realized 9d.

STOCK RISES HEAVY
