SHORT LINE ORDERED TO KEEP MILE CHARGE TO 3 CENTS.

Decision by State Commission Follow Case Presented by Attorney-Gen-

eral at Request of Public.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 29 .- (Special.)pany has been ordered by the Public Utilities Commission of this state to discontinue within 20 days charging more than 3 cents a mile for passenger service on any and all of its branch lines within this state. This order was handed down by the commission tonight. The action for a reduction in passenger mileage charged of from 4 to 3 cents was brought by the Attorney-General

The commission in its order sets forth that that the present 3-cent rate charged on the Minidoka-Buhl and Idaho Falls-Ashtoh branches is to be effective per-manently; but as to all other branch lines of the Short Line permission is given to apply for an opportunity of showing that as to such branch lines it is not unreasonable or discrimina-tory to charge a higher passenger rate for each mile than is now charged by that road on its main lines. BRIDGES COST \$21,247

Clackamas Court Checks Over Bills for Construction of Spans.

OREGON CITY, Or., Dec. 29.-(Spe-cial.)-Bills for the construction of the Barton bridge across the Clackamas, and the Meadowbrook bridge across the Molalia River, were checked over by the County Court today.
