"I believe the people of Oregon will appreciate the new boats," said Mr. Stone. "The two will bring no fewer than 1960 tourists to the Coast. There is not a line that runs out of the Atlantic Coast ports that operates steamers that can be compared with them. Reservations are in demand largely because they are such fine liners.

"About 90 per cent of the people who will make the trip are from Philadelphia, Boston and Nev York City. Most of these people have never been to the Pacific Coast. Never before has there been such an attractive trip offered to the Pacific Coast by water. Our office is the only one on Broadway that is doing any business, due to the disturbed traffic lines resulting from the European war. Our new liners will be the first high-class passenger boats to pass through the Panama Canal.
