BAD WEATHER CONTINUES

Paris reports successes at four points, at one of which 500 yards of German trenches were blown up by mine.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—French efforts to continue their advance in Alsace, according to reports from both Paris and Berlin, seem to have suffered a check.

The Paris communication says that a German trench nearly half a mile long, in the Argonne region, was blown up by the allies, according to the French statement.

Second Garibaldi Is Killed. The Paris official announcement also identified the second Garibaldi as another killed in action on the French battlefield as Chief Adjutant Constantine Garibaldi, a brother of Lieutenant-Colonel Raymond Garibaldi.

In Belgium the enemy delivered, but without success, two attacks in the region of the dunes and to the southwest of St. George. On the 5th of the front, to the north of the Lys and from the Lys to the Oise, there has been nothing except artillery fighting.

Trenches Retaken in Argonne. In the Argonne there developed a spirited action, which permitted us to retake 300 yards of trenches in the Forest of La Grurie, at the same place where there was recently a slight giving way, as previously reported.

Near the ravine of Courte Chaussee we blew up, by exploding a mine, 800 yards of German trenches, half of which we subsequently occupied.

From the Argonne to the Vosges the bad weather has continued. There is fog and mud. At different points along this front there have been fairly spirited artillery exchanges.

In the region of Thann (in Upper Alsace), in spite of the rain and the night before at Steinbach, as well as in the trenches to the southwest and to the northwest of Metz, the enemy succeeded in recouping one of his former trenches on the eastern flank of a nearby height, the summit of which, however, remains in our possession.

It should be set forth that in the Argonne, near the ravine of Courte Chaussee, at the point where we blew up the German trenches, the Italian regiment commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Garibaldi delivered a vigorous attack against the breach made by the explosion of the mine.

French trenches in the Argonne were occupied yesterday by German troops, and in Upper Alsace French troops were driven away from a position near Sennheim (Cernay), according to German official statements given out in Berlin this afternoon and wireless here.

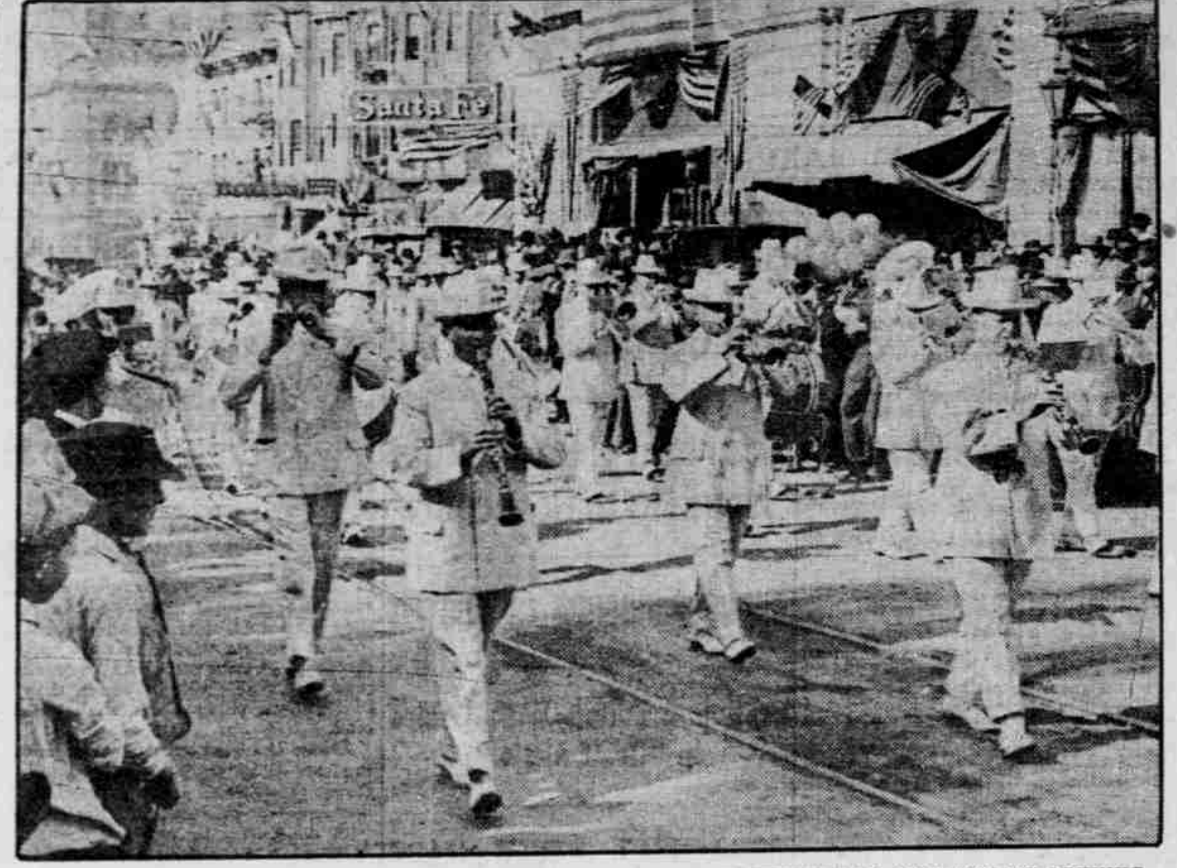
GENERAL PAU VISITS RUSSIA. Combined Control of Future Operations Believed in View.

BERLIN, Jan. 6.—It is said here that General Gerald Pau, commander of the French army in Alsace, visited Warsaw in the latter part of December. The object of his visit was to make arrangements with the Russian army staff, which, it is reported, may lead to combined control of further operations.

The bombardment of Furnes, West Flanders, and incessant attacks by aeroplanes have necessitated removal of the Belgian army headquarters to a point further to the rear, according to reports received here. Many inhabitants of Furnes already have fled and gas and water supplies have been curtailed.

CHURCH IS AROUSED

Arrest of Belgian Cardinal Scored by Berlin Catholics.

PRIESTS IMPRISONED, TOO

Reading of Pastoral Letter, Advising Against Allegiance to Germany, Is Punished—Government Upholds Action.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Amsterdam says that telegrams received there from Berlin assert that the arrest of Cardinal Mercier has caused consternation in Catholic circles.

The arrest of Cardinal Mercier has created a profound sensation throughout Belgium. According to reports received here the Germans also arrested the printer of the Cardinal's pastoral letter, who until recently was the publisher of Malines, but released him on bail.

According to the Berlin correspondent of the TSD, the following official communication has been published concerning the pastoral letter of Cardinal Mercier, who is reported to have been arrested by the German military authorities for advising Belgians not to swear allegiance to the German administration.
