CHICAGO. Jan. 7.—Wheat advanced excitedly in the last hour today. Suropean husing, that had again became rampant, was the force under the market. There was a strong close at 15 cents to 25 cents above last night. Corn rose 5 54 cents to be cent used, and oats 3 6 5 cent to 1915 cents list. Duinth reported a saic of durum wheat to Italy at \$1.995, delivered across the ses. Domestic millers were said to be easerly after cash wheat in all directions.
