

HARBOR BILL AGAIN FACES OPPOSITION

House's Insistence on "Pork" Items Imperils Success of Measure in Senate.

FILIBUSTER IS EXPECTED

Senators Preparing for Early Consideration, in Hope of Exhausting Opposition—New Appropriations Also Wanted.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Jan. 7.—The river and harbor bill, now pending in the House of Representatives, will meet stubborn resistance in the Senate, for the identical reason that the regular river and harbor bill of the last session was fought by Senator Burton and others. The pending bill, like that defeated, contains a certain amount of "pork," and the House intends to pass the bill as it was reported by the river and harbor committee, notwithstanding these trouble-making items have been inserted against the better judgment of many members.

Russian prisoners captured in the Caucasus are being conveyed to the interior of the country.

The correspondent at Brussels of the Kreuz-Zeitung asserts that it is admitted in French official circles that the losses in the French army up to December 20 were about 1,000,000 men of whom 20,000 were officers.

The Paris Matin estimates that the Russian losses in killed and wounded up to December 23 number 1,750,000, but as the Germans have captured more than 200,000 Russians and the Austrians have taken 200,000, the Russian casualties must exceed 2,000,000.

Destitute Russians living in Germany received up to the beginning of the New Year 20 marks (45) from Russia.

From January 5 the pension was reduced to five marks (\$1.25) fortnightly. The diminution is considered a proof that the Russians lack money.

Senator Burton, Senator Kenyon and others opposed to pork-barrel appropriations have been studying the bill as it was reported by the river and harbor committee, and are preparing their attack, which will be bitter and determined.

WEST DEFINES STAND

STATE HAS DONE ITS PART ON TUMALO PROJECT, IS VIEW.

In Blocking Plan to Spend \$450,000 Appropriated by State, He Says Time for Federal Action Here.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 7.—(Special.)—Regarding the report from Washington that the interior Department and the state entered into no agreement looking to the building of the Tumalo irrigation project, Governor West today made the following statement: "The statement made in the Washington dispatch to the Oregonian this morning that I had blocked a plan of State Engineer Lewis to have the Federal Government spend the \$450,000 appropriated by the state is true. The money was appropriated for a particular purpose and the reclamation of particular lands. Under the law the money could not have been given over to the Federal Government for expenditures and any attempt to do so would have delayed matters two years, as it would have called for further legislative action. Further, it would have been poor business to have turned the money over to some one else to spend. The project was so situated as to permit co-operation through independent action. The state has done its part and it is now up to the Federal Government to come through."

JAMES MANION IS DEAD

Appendicitis Fatal to Former Portland Man at San Diego.

Word was received yesterday from San Diego, Cal., of the death from appendicitis of James L. Manion, a Portland man. Mr. Manion was a native of Canada and came to Portland in 1881, engaging in the dry-goods business. Afterwards he became a traveling salesman and was well known throughout the Northwest. He has been engaged in the electrical business in Seattle.

BROTHER'S PART PLAYED

Obsession That He Is Episcopalian Missionary on Trail of Thugs Takes Hold Following His Discovery in Hospital.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 7.—(Special.)—Edward C. Cooper, manager of the Alaska Messenger Service, who disappeared from his home at 1310 Howell street in Seattle on March 1, 1914, has been found. With his discovery is cleared up Tacoma's 10 months' wonderment over the "man of mystery." Cooper, however, imagines he is his brother, Ernest A. Cooper, of Prince Albert, Cape Province, South Africa, an Episcopalian missionary, who is seeking to bring about the arrest of the thugs who caused the victim 10 months of mental darkness by drugging him the afternoon of March 1. Rev. Mr. Cooper is still in Africa and has not been here at all.
