Senators who are deeply concerned over proper appropriations for river and harbor improvements are uneasy over the fight that is sure to break out when the bill goes before the Senate. There is in some quarters a decided sentiment in favor of eliminating from the bill these items to which there is legitimate objection. In the main the disposition seems to be to push the bill, pork items and all, and astempt to force the opposition to lie down after votcing its protest.
