

NACO PEACE PACT IS FINALLY SIGNED

Sonora-Arizona Border Neutrality Is Established by Mexican Factions.

PORT OF ENTRY IS CLOSED

Chances of Repetitions of Siege With Resultant Fatalities to Americans Are Otherwise Lessened by Agreement.

NACO, Ariz., Jan. 12.—Brigadier-General Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff of the United States Army, has successfully concluded the negotiations for peace along the Mexican border, closing the port of Naco, and otherwise lessening the chance for a repetition of the siege of Naco with its accompanying "stray" fire across the line.

The revision of the agreement previously signed by General Calles and his immediate superior, General Hill, was again signed by General Calles and then sent to General Hill, commander of the Carranza troops in Naco, Sonora, have signed the agreement eliminating factional warfare along the Sonora border, closing the port of Naco, and otherwise lessening the chance for a repetition of the siege of Naco with its accompanying "stray" fire across the line.

The only change of importance in the terms is the added provision that Maytorena move his Villa troops now before Agua Prieta south to Frontera, after 25 days spent here negotiating with the factional leaders and at Juarez discussing the matter with General Villa.

VILLA CAPTURES TWO TOWNS

Heavy War Trophies Captured After Saltillo Battle.

LAREDO, Tex., Jan. 12.—Monterey is held by Carranza troops, according to reports here, which said that General Maclovio Herrera arrived there with a large force.

Reports of Villa's capture of Victoria, capital of Tamaulipas, have been declared true by persons in Nuevo Laredo, the Mexican town opposite here, who are in close touch with the fighting armies. It was said positively that Tampico still is held by Carranza forces.

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 12.—Confirmation of the reported defeat of the Carranza forces in the fighting about Saltillo, capital of the state of Coahuila, was received from General Calles, now at Chihuahua City. Among the trophies of war which were captured were 14 military trains with ample provisions, millions of cartridges and much artillery ammunition.

General Benjamin Hill, who has commanded the Carranza garrison at Naco, Sonora, during the Villa-Maytorena attack of the last two months, passed through El Paso tonight on his way to Vera Cruz, where he has been called by the "First Chief."

GOVERNOR COURT-MARTIALED

Carranza Official Overhauled at Sea and Returned for Trial.

ON BOARD U. S. S. SAN DIEGO, at San Diego, Cal., Jan. 12.—General Juan Carranza, governor of the state of Tepic, was overhauled at sea while fleeing to San Diego, and taken back to Mazatlan and there court-martialed last Saturday.

Wireless reports today carrying this news to Rear-Admiral Howard, commander of the Pacific fleet, said that the sentence of the court had been withheld from publication.

Hurricane Reaches Washington. WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—General Eduardo Barrios, the ex-commander of the Mexican federal district, who recently succeeded in escaping from his native land after representations by the United States Government had secured his release from imprisonment at the capital, has appeared in Washington. He called at the British embassy for news of his wife and child, who had taken refuge in the British legation at Mexico City.

MRS. M. SELLER PASSES

DEATH CLAIMS FORMER PORTLAND RESIDENT IN GERMANY.

Life Linked With Early History of City to Which She Came Soon After Her Marriage in 1864.

News of the death of Rosa Seller, wife of M. Seller, Monday in Frankfurt, Germany, was received by her son, F. M. Seller, of this city, by cablegram. She passed away after an extended illness, and it is believed that worry over relatives now in the German army hastened her death. She was 72 years old.

Besides her son in Portland, Mrs. Seller leaves two married daughters in Germany. The late Mrs. Philip Lowen, of Portland, was a daughter. Mrs. Seller, whose maiden name was Rosa Dittschneider, was married to M. Seller in Astoria, Ore., August 17, 1864. For many years she lived in Portland, where she had a wide circle of friends, but left this city with her husband some years ago, when he undertook the foreign business of M. Seller & Co., the firm he established here many years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Seller came to Portland soon after their marriage, the business having already been started here by Mr. Seller, who had reached this city in 1859. They were prominent in the early business and social life of Portland.

Last August the couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in Frankfurt, F. M. Seller visiting them at that time. As war broke out while he was abroad, he hastened home via Switzerland and England, returning sooner than he had expected. Many Portland people extended congratulations and best wishes at the time of the golden wedding.

Gubbins, who has begun proceedings to divorce his English wife on the ground of desertion, last night broke his silence and made a detailed statement.

NOTORIOUS CONVICT HERE

Frank Callan, Fugitive From Folsom Prison, Taken Back Captive.

Frank Callan, who, several years ago, held up a stage on San Francisco street, and served 12 years in the Folsom prison and escaped, and who was recaptured in Portland Monday on the way back to the California penitentiary, George Kinloch, special agent of the State of California, is in charge of the prisoner.

When Callan fled from Folsom he was fired upon by five guards and escaped. He was directly between two guards who were not 30 feet apart and escaped without a scratch.

The fugitive was discovered in a saloon at Spokane after several hold-ups and a special squad rode down on the place. Guards were stationed at the front door and at the back just as Callan attempted to hold up the place. Callan, seeing the guards enter by the front door, sought for the back, rushed through the guard and escaped. The police then trailed him in an automobile and finally outwitted him.

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WAR VETERAN AGED 100

MICHAEL DAMPHOFFER RECALLS SERVICE FOR TWO NATIONS.

Vancover Man in French Army and in American Army in Mexican, Civil and Indian Conflicts.

YANCOVER, Wash., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Michael Damphoffer, veteran of the French army, the Mexican war, the Indian uprisings of 1856-58, and of the Civil War, was a century old today. He was born in France in 1815.

Michael Damphoffer joined the French army in 1836, and was assigned to the band. A slide trombone, which instrument he learned to play, was given to him. He served in the band six years.

The old slide trombone is yet preserved by Mr. Damphoffer, and the same leather case it was in when he got it yet protects it. The leather, however, is dried up and drawn and bears the stamp of time.

In 1842 Mr. Damphoffer was mustered out of the French army and emigrated to the United States. When he arrived in the United States he joined the United States Army and was sent to Mexico. The war over he came West with his family, and finally, in 1856, he came to the United States.

His son, Michael Damphoffer, Jr., enlisted with him in the First Oregon Cavalry, and they fought side by side. Mr. Damphoffer, Jr., was killed in 1864, and his father and son lived together at Thirteenth and Reserve streets here. The father is just 30 years older than the son.

Until about two years ago Mr. Damphoffer, Sr., always marched with the Grand Army on Memorial day, but could not, because he was unable to ride in an automobile, and he now always occupies a place of honor on the speaker's stand. He has hoped for many years to reach his century. He still is in fairly good health.

MANY RULES TO CHANGE

HOUSE COMMITTEE IN FAVOR OF GREAT REVISION.

One Amendment Provides for Separate Appropriations to Be in Different Bills—Fund Acts to Be First.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Numerous amendments to the House bill providing for a revision of the rules, which will be reported by the committee on rules, which held a lengthy session last night, will be introduced. The changes will follow substantially those suggested last week by Ben Selling, although the ideas of some of the members will be incorporated into them.

What is regarded as the most radical revision is that providing that appropriations bills be separated from other bills. Proposed appropriations on different subjects must be incorporated in separate bills.

Appropriation bills also will have precedence over all other bills and will have the top place on the calendar every day until their disposition is settled.

All proposed amendments must be printed in italics and all matter that is proposed to strike out must be printed in bold type. Amendments must be printed and distributed on the members' desks before they can be acted upon, according to the committee's decision.

Committee meetings will be public but the schedule idea was abandoned. The rule limiting the time for introducing bills probably will remain as at present, 10 days. Allen Eaton will bring in a minority report asking that this limit be cut to 15 days.

All bills must be printed and in the hands of members three days before coming up for final passage.

The proposal to place the employment of clerks and stenographers in charge of a committee or bureau of the Secretary of State's office is meeting with serious opposition. It is probable that the former practice of electing each member his own clerk or stenographer will be retained. This question, however, will be fought out in the House.

Clerks will be allowed excepting those for the ways and means, judiciary and revision of laws committees. The members of the rules committee are Forbes, Hinkle, Eaton, Jeffries and Lewis.

The first step in the work was the erection of a 300-horsepower electrical plant, driven by steam, to provide light from both sides of the river, drive the centrifugal pumps and pull the little dump cars by means of a third-rail system, hauling materials from the distant bluffs for the concrete mixers.

By means of cofferdams, excavations for the development were made to 21 feet below low water and a forest of piles driven—11,000 in all—upon which was laid the thousands of cubic yards of concrete and rock.

As the work progressed from both shores the river was made narrower and its depth and velocity were increased, and the false work was washed out again and again. The flow and record-breaking high water drove out the work on several occasions, the water going five and six feet above normal high water.

By means of 41 gates, 14 feet high and 20 feet wide, on the spillway, the flow of the river was controlled at all stages of floods is permitted. At Prairie du Sac the mean low water flow of the river is 5000 feet per second, and the high flood stage reached 65,000 feet. A lift lock, 35 feet wide and 170 feet long, takes care of navigation at the Prairie du Sac dam.

VISIT ENDS IN KILLING

ULRICH HERZIG IS BLAMED FOR JOSEPH SCHALLBERGER'S DEATH.

Dairymen Near Beaverton Say He Aimed Shotgun at Neighbor as "Bluff" When Weapons Fired.

HILLSBORO, Or., Jan. 12.—(Special.)—Ulrich Herzig, aged 42 years, was brought to the county jail today, charged with killing Joseph Schallberger, aged about 30. The killing took place about 7:30 last night at the home of Herzig, one mile east of Beaverton. Schallberger, his father, and his brother, Teddy, were at Herzig's home on Sunday, when an altercation said to have occurred.

Herzig pointed a shotgun at Schallberger, who was advancing upon him, it is said. The weapon was discharged, hitting Schallberger in the chest. Herzig immediately notified the officials and was taken into custody.

Herzig said today that he had no intention of shooting the young man, and merely intended his move as a "bluff" to make him get home. He said, Schallberger and his brothers were becoming noisy. He loaded the gun and young Schallberger advanced on him.

Herzig bears an excellent reputation, and had resided near Beaverton four years. He is unmarried and had worked for the Garden City dairy for several years before moving to his present residence. Herzig was born in Switzerland, and was naturalized in Portland in August, 1910.

The Schallbergers conduct a dairy two miles from Beaverton.
