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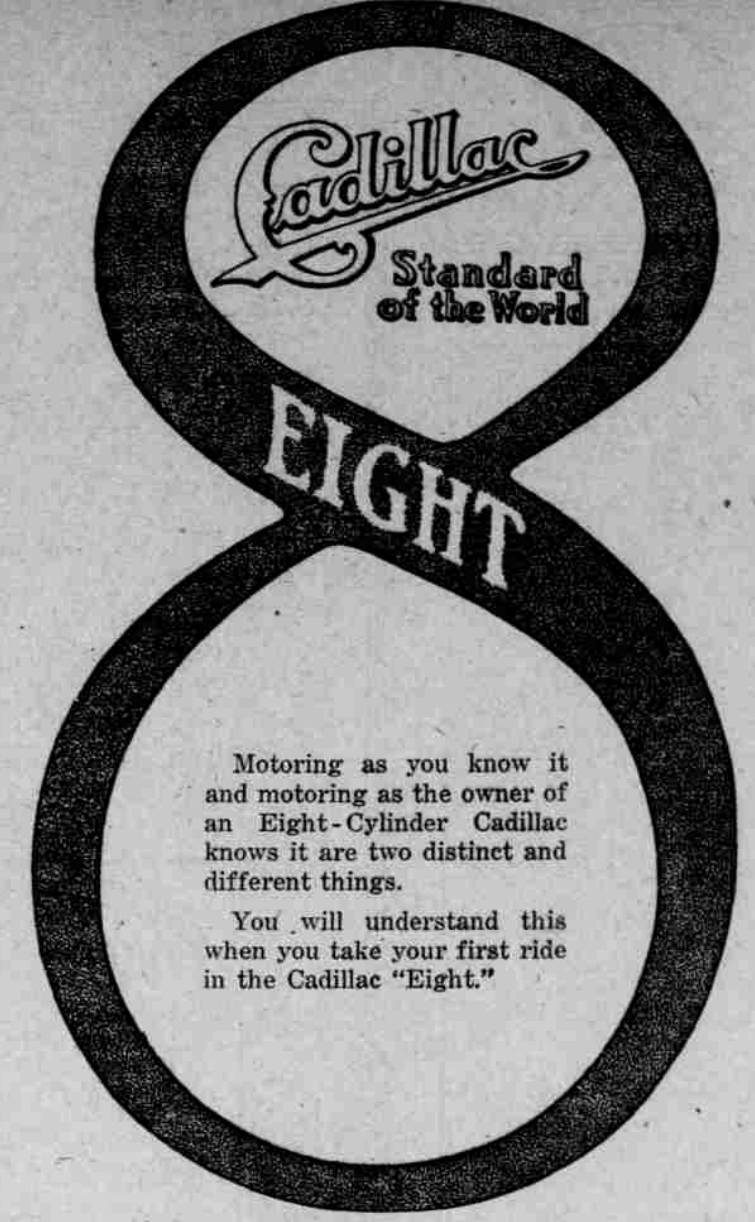

EUGENE THURMAN FREED

COMPANION OF BOY SLAIN TRYING TO ROB STORE PAROLED.

Stern Warning Given Youth Who Consesses Attempting Burglary to Get Money for Trip to Fair.

Eugene Thurman, who confessed that he was implicated in the attempted burglary of the Pangborn confectionery store on East Broadway as much as was his companion, Hazen Smith, who was shot and killed by the proprietor when the two tried to enter the store the night of January 18, was released on probation by Municipal Judge Stevenson yesterday afternoon with a stern warning.

That was a mighty bad start for a young man," asserted Judge Stevenson. "You might have been killed. The only reason you were not is that Hazen Smith was in front. You must go straight from now on if I follow the recommendation of the District Attorney. Listen, one mistake, a single slip from the right path, and you will go before the grand jury."

Thurman will report weekly to Probation Officer Inskeep.
