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GREAT PIANIST COMING

DAVID CAMPBELL TO PLAY HERE AT Y. M. C. A. SATURDAY.

Oregon Musician, Brother of Head of University, to Appear for First Time in Portland.

David Campbell, Oregon pianist, will be heard in recital, for the first time in this city, at the auditorium of the Young Men's Christian Association, Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

Mr. Campbell is a young man, reputed to be a positive genius at the piano. This piano talent has been carefully fostered. Three years ago, Mr. Campbell became a piano student of the famous Rudolph Ganz, at the Ganz studio on the shores of Lake Geneva, Switzerland, and it is said that under

the inspiration and instruction of such an eminent piano virtuoso as Herr Ganz, Mr. Campbell has made marvelous progress in piano interpretation and execution.

Several months ago, Mr. Campbell's piano studies were interrupted by the war, and he arrived in this country to participate in a concert tour. In California cities and also cities in the Pacific Northwest, Mr. Campbell has appeared in piano concerts distinguished by unusual success.

He is to appear as a concert pianist in this city, for the first time, it is expected he will be greeted by a large audience. Mr. Campbell is a brother of President Campbell, of the University of Oregon.

Adagio, Allegro, Andante e Pressivo, Vivacissimamente; "Ballade G Minor" (Chopin); "Nocturne B Major" (Chopin); "Valse E Minor" (Chopin); "Pavane" (Chopin); "Rhapsodie F Sharp Minor" (Dobnanyi); Paraphrase de concert sur l'opera "Cugan Oregin" (Tchaikowsky-Pabst).
