With only one dissenting vote, that of Commissioner Bigelow, the City Council yesterday passed Mayor Albee's ordinance creating the position of Public Defender in the Portland Municipal Court at a salary of \$150 a month. Commissioner Bigelow said the duties to be assigned the defender can be taken care of by the Deputy City Attorney assigned to the Municipal Court.

POSTOFFICE CLERKS STAY

Order for Economy Not Effective Here as Force Is at Lowest.

The recent order issued by Postmaster-General Burleson calling for intensive economy in his department, to be obtained by cutting down the days of employment if consistent with the maintenance of the service, will have little effect on the office in Portland, according to Postmaster Meyers. "We have already cut expenses to the bone in this office," said Mr. Meyers, "and the Portland office is being operated perhaps more economically than any other office in the country, and is turning in larger profits to the Government."
