

DRY BILL PASSED

Senate is Asked to Accept Original Act or Make Several Changes.

LIMIT CALLED SECONDARY

Arthur M. Churchill, Chairman of Legal Committee, Declares House Measure Contains Irritants That Harm Cause.

Declaring that the original bill of the Committee of One Hundred, which limits the amount of alcohol that may be imported into the state...

The original Committee of One Hundred's bill, known as House Bill No. 1, was drawn up by a special committee consisting of Arthur M. Churchill, A. J. ...

Enforceable Law Wanted. "To obtain such a result the law must be drastic in the sense that it must be absolute and without loopholes for evasion."

Personally I am inclined to believe that the amendments proposed on our bill in the House contain several unnecessary irritants. I do not believe it is necessary that alcohol or liquor shipment records be open to the inspection of every citizen.

"Section 8, as amended, makes it necessary to obtain a physician's prescription every time one wants to buy alcohol for a bath. I do not think this helps at all and it could be a nuisance and waste of expense."

"Section 6, as amended, also makes no provision for more than a two-quart limit for alcohol used in manufacture of the arts. This is a very small quantity."

"It is of secondary consequence in Oregon to restrict the amount of alcohol that may be imported from other states."

"The constitutional amendment does not forbid shipment. We made that clear during the campaign. Our bill was prepared to carry out that amendment and make it enforceable."

"Nevertheless, the Legislature has the power to go beyond the amendment if it deems best. And, inasmuch as the subject has been so much discussed, I think a limit should be imposed."

"But this limit should cover the reasonable requirements of any adult, so that, as is the case in Kansas, if he serves on a jury he will say: 'This law permits me to ship in lawfully all that is necessary for my personal use. If I choose to take the trouble, the scoundrel who comes round trying to tempt people with a bootleg full of poison shall have no sympathy from me.'"

"The words 'or family' should come out of the limit clause. Perhaps two quarts of whisky a month is a high enough limit. I think many will feel we have not dealt fairly with them in allowing only two quarts of wine, and if 24 quarts of beer are not enough for a man's reasonable monthly requirements, it should be raised."

Original Provisions Upheld. "The Senate committee will need to amend several phrases in the bill if it is to be effective. In shifting language about to meet the ideas of various individuals and delegations the House committee has inadvertently eliminated from our bill several vital parts, one of which, for instance, is required to bring section 11 within the Federal Webb-Kenyon act."

CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE OF ONE HUNDRED DEPRECATES RADICAL AMENDMENTS TO PROHIBITION BILL

PASADENA, Cal., Feb. 7.—(Special.)—Why is it that 50 per cent of our people don't know what they mean to society? Is it that our people don't realize where our wages go? ...

I am very sorry to see that the bill drawn by our Committee of One Hundred has been changed so radically. I feel that our bill kept faith with the people who supported us and on all important matters carried out the spirit of the amendment. ...

We are opposed to the manufacture of liquor in the state, principally on account of the interest of the brewery in the saloon. Manufacturing is one thing, but the question of a large percentage of the saloons owned by the brewers is another. ...

When you make the saloon the issue and show a disposition to play fair, a large majority of the voters are with you. When you are narrow and small, you lose them. The highest tribunal in our land is public opinion. The way to make legislation effective is to be reasonable and keep public opinion with you. ...

Newport, tonight decided to protest against the recent action of the Senate in amending the life out of one of his bills. ...

In the early part of the session he introduced a measure to exempt persons fishing in the Pacific Ocean and the idea was to accommodate summer vacationists at the beach resorts. The House promptly passed the bill. ...

The House concurred. Tonight's amendment consisted in striking out the words "Pacific Ocean," which were the very words he wanted in the bill. ...

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PRESENT OREGON AND WASHINGTON LAWS RETAINED.

Committees Decide on Increased Licenses to Maintain Hatcheries—Report to Rensh Senate Today.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 7. (Special.)—That the present laws in force in Oregon and Washington regarding fishing in the Columbia River virtually remain unchanged with the exception that fishing licenses be increased 50 per cent for the benefit of hatcheries, will be the report made in the Senate tomorrow by the joint committee of Oregon, which conferred with a similar committee from the Washington Legislature in Portland Saturday. ...

The report which was adopted by the committees representing both states, was prepared by a subcommittee consisting of Senators Bingham, chairman, and Stuart, of Oregon, and Senators Imus of Washington and Representatives Lowman, of Washington, and Anderson of Oregon. ...

Senator Bingham said the object in increasing the licenses was to raise sufficient money from that source for the hatcheries, so appropriations would not be necessary. Under the present law of Oregon, the fishing industry in the Columbia has doubled. ...

Senator Bingham said the report recommended the modification of the Washington law to permit gill-net fishing within one-quarter mile of the mouth of the Lewis and Klama rivers. It also is provided that the qualifications for obtaining licenses in Washington be amended to remove the United States citizenship time limit as well as the age and also to the number of licenses a person or firm may hold. ...

8-HOUR ACT NOW LIKED

BOTH HOUSES LIKELY TO EXEMPT STATE INSTITUTIONS.

Bill is Reconsidered When Economical Feature is Explained—Measure Up Today.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 7. (Special.)—The reconsideration by the Senate of the bill to exempt employees of the state institutions from the eight-hour law, it is believed, will result in its passage by both houses. ...

When the measure, which was introduced by Senators Ragsdale and Stewart at the request of State Treasurer Kay, was defeated by the Senate its full significance was not understood. Labor Commissioner Hoff about a year ago said he believed it applied to the employees of institutions and, to test the law, had Superintendent Bennett of the State Prison for the Insane arrested. The point at issue was not definitely decided by the Supreme Court, although that court held that the law was not intended to exempt the provisions of the eight-hour law. ...

Another question is the Westworth bill providing for a change in the court system in Multnomah County. The bill proposes that the Juvenile Court be transferred from Judge Gatens' department to that of Judge Cleston. This step is urged in the interests of economy. It is pointed out that Judge Gatens is overburdened with work and that Judge Cleston has not enough to do to earn his salary. The interested Judges have been asked to attend the meeting. ...
