Report by State Superintendent of Banks Is From Jan. 13 to Dec. 31. Savings deposits in the banks of the state show a gain of \$2,012,470 between the dates of January 13 and December 31, 1914, the period covered by the report just issued by S. G. Sargent, Superintendent of Banks, on the condition of state, National banks and trust companies. Of this sum the Portland banks reported about half the gain.
