

FRENCH SOLDIERS' LOSSES ARE HEAVY

Actions by Small Forces Are Without Effect on General Plan of Operations.

10 DAYS RELATIVELY CALM

PARIS, Feb. 9.—In an account of three weeks from January 27 to the evening of February 6 an "eye-witness" with the French army says: "The last period of ten days has been one of comparative calm. The actions, engaged in by small forces, have developed upon limited fronts without effect on the operations generally."

domestic disputes are solved, Judge Brown said: "The aim of the court is to preserve the home. It therefore does not rush into the prosecution of the husband, but invites him to come to the probations office and tell his side of the story. Frequently reconciliations were effected. This means that many homes were restored, involving not only the welfare of the husband and wife, but the happiness and the future of their children."

"Reconciliation is not always possible. Then the court endeavors to adjust the financial obligation, if any, of the husband to his wife and children. Not only the man's earning power, but his record for good living are taken into consideration in disposing of a case."

Husbands who have been ordered to pay for the support of their wives or children may be assisted in obtaining employment, as some have already been assisted by the court.

"The causes which lead to domestic troubles and jeopard the welfare of the children are of various kinds, and ascertained by the court. As the conservator of the home, the guide and protector of unfortunate children, the court has made a good beginning of a work which is destined to lead to results of the highest humanitarian value."

"The receipts and expenditures of the court are also worthy of mention. The court cost the county \$53,925. If it were credited with the savings of expense to the county represented by the number of non-injury trials, as compared with the cost of sending the number of cases before juries, this item of \$53,900 would be wiped out. But, as a matter of fact, the cost was \$29,192.12, and the saving of the county account shows \$175,452.14."

SUFFRAGE SET TO MUSIC

Philadelphian Gets Inspiration When Stranded in Europe.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 4.—Woman suffrage at last has found worthy interpretation in the music of a well-known composer of this city, Philip H. Goepf, who recently has written an anthem with a suffrage theme. It was sung for the first time a day or two ago at the mass meeting under the auspices of the Equal Franchise Society, at the Garrick Theater.

The music is distinctly inspirational in character, and although to be heard as a solo at the meeting, it is intended to be sung in unison. Changing chords vary the simple melody, which is set to marching time.

Although in favor of suffrage for many years, Mr. Goepf first received the impetus for the composition on his last trip to Europe, where he was stranded at the beginning of war. His experience in Germany, observing the "hysterical brutality and lust for slaughter of man," convinced him of the needful influence of woman in the political life of a nation.

"In the music of the hymn I have tried to express the goal of womanhood, the opportunity to work in cooperation with man," Mr. Goepf said. "There is no doubt in my mind that we need the idealism, as well as the common sense, of women in public life, and that she is needed to prevent further retrogression of man-made civilization."

Mr. Goepf framed his anthem to the words of a hymn written by Professor Simon M. Patten, of the University of Pennsylvania. The hymn reads: "Half woman triumphant, the world is saved. O world, be glad, when woman's hand is raised. Bring sinners to the path of life, and turn darkness to day."
