

GUNS BOOM DOWN GERMAN AIR SCOUT

Machine Set on Fire by Artillery, but Lands Within Its Own Lines.

BATTLE RAGES IN WOODS

Opposing Lines Fight Behind Trees as in Early Days of Settlement of America — German Mine Gallery Is Destroyed.

PARIS, Feb. 9.—At a point between the Oise and the Aisne, French artillerymen have been successful in bringing down a German aeroplane. The machine, in flames, landed within the German lines.

This announcement was given out officially today. The official report on the fighting in the Argonne forests was much like the battles between the early settlers and the Indians in the wars of the States. Detachments from both sides fought behind tree trunks, each side, generally speaking, maintaining its line.

German Mine Gallery Destroyed.
The late official report said: "During the afternoon Monday, February 8, we blew up in front of Fay, southeast of Peronne, a mine gallery in which the enemy's soldiers were at work."

The earlier report said: "In the Belgium yesterday there were intermittent artillery exchanges, and Ypres and Furnes were bombarded. The Belgian artillery continued a farm, the owners of which fled."

"On the road between Bethune and La Bassée we yesterday reconquered a mile where the enemy had succeeded in installing himself."

"Solomon was bombarded with projectiles, the purpose of which was to cut the city on the left. On all the Aisne front and in Champagne our artillery effectively engaged the batteries of the Germans."

Fighting in Forest Confused.
"In the Argonne, the fight which has developed around Bazelle continued yesterday in one of the most dense parts of the forest and consequently became quite confused. Each side, generally speaking, was successful in maintaining its lines. The men engaged in this fight February 7 did not exceed three or four battalions on each side. During yesterday only one French battalion was engaged."

"In Lorraine and in the Vosges yesterday saw our engagements." "The German War Office report on the progress of the fighting dated February 9, and wirelessly followed, said: 'On the East Prussian frontier we have had several minor local successes, otherwise the situation is unchanged.'"

GREECE ASSERTS RIGHTS

Reply to Germany Says Nation Is Not to Blame for Others' Acts.

ATHENS (via London), Feb. 9.—In response to a notification from the German government of its declaration including within the war zone the waters about the British Isles, the Greek government today sent a reply in which it insists that the rights of Greece must be respected.

Referring to the German declaration that English vessels were making use of neutral flags, the government contends that Greece cannot be held responsible for the acts of other nations. The government intimates that Greece expects her ships will continue to enjoy the guarantee provided by international law, especially those in the declaration of London.

LISS PIONEER DIES AT 67

John R. Baltimore Is Survived by Three Children.

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 9.—(Special).—John R. Baltimore, pioneer of 1832 and resident of Linn County for more than 60 years, died today at his home in this city at the age of 67 years. Mr. Baltimore was born in Indiana in 1847 and when 6 years old crossed the plains with his parents to Oregon. The family settled in Linn County.

Mr. Baltimore is survived by three children, Doris McKnight, in California, and Lennie Campbell and Ruth Gould, both of Albany. He leaves three grandsons, P. J. Baltimore, of this city; William V. Baltimore, of Portland, and Wesley Baltimore, of Mill City, and one sister, Mrs. C. H. Hunt, of Albany.

WAR RISK RATES DOWN

Trans-Pacific Put on Same Basis as Japanese.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The War Risk Insurance Bureau today reduced the rates for war-risk insurance on trans-Pacific traffic to meet the rates granted Japanese ships through the war-risk plan recently approved by the Japanese government.

From one-quarter of 1 cent per cent the rates were reduced to 3 cents per \$100 from Pacific Coast ports to Japan, and 10 cents per \$100 to China and Manila. Officials here reduced rates to enable American shipowners on the Pacific to meet Japanese competition.

"Whitewash" Is Denied.
Mr. Tumulty denied that the White House had ever exonerated or "whitewashed" Minister Sullivan. He said that J. Franklin Fort, who had headed a commission to settle a Dominican revolution, had told the President that Minister Sullivan was a "big-hearted Irishman" and that "there was nothing against him." He declined to express any opinion as to Sullivan's fitness for office, but criticized "Vick as a 'borehead.'"

Counsel E. H. Strong, for the Commissioner, put into the record a letter from Mr. Tumulty, in which he said that Samuel D. Wilson, of Philadelphia, had telephoned the White House saying he had information which "seriously reflected on Minister Sullivan." But that he did not wish to testify without first consulting Mr. Tumulty. The letter said Minister Sullivan had been advised to

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It is understood that no protest or complaint against any violation of international law is to be directed to either country. The Administration view of the hoisting of the American flag on the Lusitania is that it is a customary rule of war, but at the same time representations are being made to point out how easily neutral commerce might suffer through continued practice of the stratagem.

Germany Asked for Details.
As for Germany, an admiralty proclamation that it may be difficult to determine the character of the vessel found in the war zones, especially because of the misuse of neutral flags, the United States Government intends to ask for more information as to the methods by which the order will be carried out in practice and in preparing to point out that it expects every effort to be made to verify the nature of the ships flying neutral flags, assuming that due respect for the safety of Americans will be given.

With the question of declaring certain waters as in the zones of war, the United States Government is concerned.

Delay Is to Be Expected.
Neither communication will go forward, it is understood, until complete information is available, which may cause a delay of several days. The long memorandum of the German Foreign Office, sent by wireless to the American press, has not reached the State Department from Ambassador Janina.

It is probably the intention of the German Government to take pending its arrival. Nor has Ambassador Page at London transmitted any official report as to the reasons for the delay.

He called the State Department today the text of the British Foreign Office statement, published two days ago, in which it declared that the use of vessels or neutral flags to escape capture. He said the statement had not been formally presented to him, but that on inquiry at the Foreign Office, its authenticity was confirmed.

In the absence of any official statement from Great Britain to the United States on the case of the Lusitania, any inquiry which may be made by this Government on the subject of the Lusitania will be based on the foreign office statement, and confined to the general question rather than any specific case.

SERBIAN CHILDREN DIE

FOOD AND MEDICINE LACKING, AND COUNTRY IS COLD.

Appeal for Help Declares Nation Will Starve Unless Seed and Farm Tools Are Furnished People.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Famine faces war-wracked Serbia unless the people can obtain grain for seed in the Spring and farm tools to work with. According to a statement issued tonight by a committee newly organized to seek aid in this country for the destitute Serbian women and children.

Highly educated and cultured people will starve if these things cannot be secured, the committee affirmed. In six of the most fertile districts of Serbia 20 per cent of the children now are dying from lack of nourishment and medicine, from cold and exposure.

"All of the able-bodied men of Serbia are at the front," said the statement. "The women and children must plant and cultivate the crops in the Spring or there will be no harvest. The nation can live next Winter. Now the farms are devastated, buildings and implements burned and livestock destroyed. These conditions, a famine is inevitable."

The committee gave out an excerpt from a recent statement by the head of the Serbian Church, which said: "Today one third of the population is destitute of everything. Since the beginning of the war, when their lands were turned into battlefields, they have endured terrible privations, the mothers, wives and the children of a million Serbians are suffering from lack of food, clothing and shelter. Their homes have been pillaged and destroyed and when the unfortunate refugees return to their homes they will, in the majority of cases, find neither house nor food."

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"I did not see any battleships, but I saw quite a few submarines, and was stopped more than once. One submarine bobbed up out of the water alongside of me and then a voice shouted to me: 'What is your home port?'"

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GERMAN ADVANCE ON WARSAW STOPS

Russians, Meanwhile, Report Resuming Offensive on Both Wings Along Line.

EAST PRUSSIA IN DANGER

Von Hindenburg Thought to Have Drawn From Center to Reinforce His Left — Austro-German Allies Make Gains.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—The fierce German attack on the Warsaw front is again at a standstill, according to reports received from both Berlin and Petrograd. On the other hand the Russian capital reports that on each wing of the eastern battle line, the Russian offensive has been resumed.

An official Russian communication asserts that the Russians have made progress on the Hungarian side of the Western Carpathian range, as well as successful success in the direction of Mezolaboriz, which resulted in driving back the enemy with considerable losses in guns and prisoners.

Fighting Desperate in East Prussia.
The Austro-German army is said to have met reverses on the Galician side of the Uzesk and Beskid passes. Balancing these Russian successes are the Russian admission of a defeat before the strong forces in Bukovina, and the Austrian assertion of having entered the town of Kimpoling in the crown land.

In East Prussia fighting apparently is assuming a more desperate character. This may account for the lull on the Warsaw front, as the East Prussian forces may have been reinforced by some of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's veterans.

German Women Join Fighting.
A dispatch from Petrograd quotes a news telegram from Warsaw as saying that among the prisoners taken by the Russians in the fighting at the junction of the Baura River were several German women. According to this message, some of these women were found with rifles in their hands in the first line of trenches.

The fighting line from the Province of Posen in Russian Poland, as far north as Tilsit, in East Prussia, is virtually continuous. The Germans today apparently are taking the offensive from Gumbinnen, near the Masurian lakes, as far south as Lipno, in Poland, on the right bank of the Vistula. The official statement of the Austro-Hungarian War Office issued today said:

"There has been no change in Poland and West Galicia, where artillery engagements have been in progress. It was recalled today that about two years ago the priest received several letters from New York demanding money from him under threat of serious harm."

Polish Allies Capture Village.
The Austro-German allies yesterday, after a battle of several days, took a village north of Volovec, which the Russians had stubbornly defended. Numerous prisoners and much ammunition and war material were captured.

"On the other Carpathian fronts severe battles are being fought. In the western section the Russian attacks were unsuccessful and 340 prisoners and three machine guns fell into our hands. We continue to occupy Bukovina and have occupied Wama."

Russians Are Driven Back.
Vienna Reports Capture of Position North of Carpathian Pass.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Capture of a position north of the Pass of Volovec by the Austro-Hungarian troops after a vigorous encounter with the Russians, and further advance of the Austro-Hungarian and German armies in Bukovina, with the occupation of Hungarian territory here from Vienna today.

"In Poland and West Galicia there is no change. Artillery duels took place on the mountain fronts yesterday. The allied Austro-Hungarian-German troops captured a place to the north of Volovec, which had been stubbornly defended by the Russians. Many prisoners and much war material were captured. On the rest of the Carpathian front violent engagements have taken place. In the western section the Russian attacks failed and 340 prisoners and three machine guns were taken. Our advance in Bukovina continues, and the town of Wama has been occupied by our troops."
