

### COMMERCIAL CLUB DINNER ORIENTAL

Rooms Transformed Into Real Tea Garden and Geisha Girls Play Harps.

### SOUVENIRS GIVEN GUESTS

Japanese Consul Is Introduced and in Clever Address Tells Hosts of Friendship of People of Land of Rising Sun.

Amid an Oriental atmosphere, laden with the perfume and blossoms of the Land of the Rising Sun, about 180 guests dined and danced last night at the Commercial Club's Japanese party.

On each table was a Japanese basket filled with luscious pears from the orchards of the Mikado, and shaggy pink chrysanthemums and asparagus fern were strewn upon the festive boards.

#### Geisha Girl Appears.

Many novel features were introduced during the evening, among them the appearance of a "Japanese cook" bearing a genuine Jirickelisa girl shyly smiling at the throngs of American friends.

Every course of the elaborate menu was suggestive of the land of the cherry blossom, the bees being made to represent the Japanese flag, in which were stuck miniature American and Japanese flags.

An interesting discovery was made when the committee in charge of the dance endeavored to secure the services of one of the club's Japanese boys to pull the Jirickelisa. They absolutely refused, saying, "only the lowest class of Japanese did that sort of thing," so it was necessary to get one of the club's boys to make him to represent the real collier.

#### Girls Play Kote.

The two dainty Geisha girls, attired in court costume—the Misses K. Tuzi and K. Matsunome—were educated in a party the same as were played the native instrument called the "kote," or Japanese harp. S. Ban assisted the committee materially in making the Japanese high school and secured the services of the Geisha girls, and helped in many ways. K. Kumasaki, Japanese Consul, was likewise much interested in the affair and also helped the committee extensively.

### CHURCH CASE NOW BATTLE OF WITS

Attorney and Professor Engage in Lively Contest in Court.

### INSURGENT SIDE CLOSES

"Regular" Faction of First Methodist Episcopal Body Will Present Its Testimony Today—Bishop's Name Used by Attorney Pipes.

A battle of wits between Norman C. Thorne, a professor in Portland Academy, and John S. Cleland, attorney for the "regular" faction of the First Methodist Episcopal Church, served to enliven proceedings in Circuit Judge Gatens' court yesterday in the suit of "insurgents" to force open the doors of the old Taylor-street church.

Mr. Thorne went on the witness stand Monday afternoon, and with the exception of several hours yesterday, has occupied the chair almost continuously since. He had acted as secretary pro tem. at some of the meetings of the official board of the church in considering the matter of consolidating the Taylor-street and Grace churches. It was the evident intention of the "regulars" that Mr. Thorne had been one of the ring-leaders in the church rebellion.

#### Benjamin H. Barton.

Benjamin H. Barton, a pioneer of 1853, died at the home of his son near Colfax, Wash., January 16 at 88 years of age. In 1853 he crossed the plains from Iowa with his wife and one child, now with Mrs. John W. Barton, of Portland, and after a six months' journey reached Eugene. In 1879 he moved to Whitman County, Washington.

### CITY MAY SET WAGE

Contractors Likely to Have \$3 Minimum for Municipal Work.

Increasing the wages of the men the cost of paving would be increased about 7 per cent. Commissioner Dieck said he thought it would run higher than that.

### LEGALITY TO BE PASSED ON

Point Raised That Cost of Paving Would Be Increased 7 Per Cent, but Three Commissioners Advocate Requirement.

In spite of the fact that such a measure would increase paving costs in the city about 7 per cent, a majority of the City Council yesterday tentatively approved Commissioner Daly's proposed ordinance to require all contractors doing public work in Portland to pay laborers not less than \$3 a day and to give preference to local people over workmen from outside the city or the state.
