JAMES K. KELLY SPEAKS AT LENTS ON METHODS OF RAISING FUNDS.

Committee Investigating Methods With View to Deciding Whether to Advocate Issue of Bonds.

ARMY GRANGE TOPIC

JAMES K. KELLY, CHAIRMAN OF A COMMITTEE OF FIVE FROM EVENING STAR GRANGE, APPOINTED TO INVESTIGATE THE PROPOSED ISSUE OF BOND TO IMPROVE ROAD PAVEMENTS FOR COUNTY ROADS.

James K. Kelly, chairman of a committee of five from Evening Star Grange, appointed to investigate the proposed issue of bond to improve road pavements for county roads, outlined the purpose of the committee in his address at the Lents before the Army Grange yesterday. The latter Grange appointed a committee to co-operate in the investigation and a survey that would be made to see what time has been started. Kelly spoke of the Empire State paving bill which the Legislature and explained that the object of this measure is to cut out patent pavements.
