Telephone Message From Estranged Husband to Friend Announces He Is Returning to Cleveland and Taking His Children,

Sarah and Fredia Gollombek, respectively 6 and 8 years old, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Gollombek, were kidnaped fate Saturday while at play in front of their home, 228 Sheridan street, and are now on their way to Cleveland. Ohio, with their father, ac cording to a telephone message re-ceived from him by Heyman Solnick. As a result, Mrs. Gollombek is a nervous wreck. All night Saturday and throughout yesterday she cried loudly for her missing daughters, without chom she says she cannot live.

Neighbors of Mrs. Gollombek have been writing the father of the desti-tute condition his children were in, and upon hearing this he came to Port-land and apparently kidnaped the children. Mr. and Mrs. Gollombek have been separated for six months.

## Mother Becomes Hysterical.

Upon being informed that her chil-dren were kidnaped by an unidentified person Saturday, Mrs. Gollombek be-came hysterical. Neighbors tried to calm her, but their efforts have been

in vain.

According to Heyman Solnick, Mr. Gollombek would welcome a reconciliation with his wife.

"Mr. Gollombek has been corresponding with his wife, according to letters I have received from him, and she has falled to answer," said Mr. Solnick yesterday. "This morning I got a telephone call from him. He was in Vancouver at the time and he told me that he had the childrene with him and was about to start for Cleveland. I am sorry that this affair has turned out as it did." out as it did.
