On the eve of the close of the campaign for 1900 members in 14 hours, the Portland Young Men's Christian Association yesterday afternoon had 201 members, 94 men and 107 boys. Portland Association today starts out with 550 members to climb up to the 1000 mark. The points scored yesterday in the standings with the Seattle Association were 179,400. Colonel Carpenter's division producing 66,550. The total receipts for membership amounted to \$1252.

Sixty-six of the boys brought in yesterday were carriers of The Oregonian, the paper giving the association a check for \$145 to cover their membership dues. Julius Meier also donated membership fees for the boys of the Meier & Frank Company.

**Salesmen Will Work Today.**  
Today 100 of the most experienced salesmen of the city will be enlisted in the association teams and sent out to procure memberships. At an 8:30 o'clock breakfast the instructions to the new workers will be given and the all-day campaign will be on. The pastors of the city will join with the workers in the meeting before the final effort of the contest is made.

Dozens of automobiles are to be brought into the city today to carry the workers through the city to enroll men and boys on the last day of the campaign.

There will be no rally at luncheon today and the workers will keep in the field until the results are tabulated at 4:15 o'clock tonight. Precisely at 9 o'clock the returns will be forwarded to Seattle and the Puget Sound city will send its results here.

**Seattle Foes Enthusiastic.**  
Captain J. W. Day reported yesterday that the Seattle workers, with whom he has been visiting for two days, have worked up a great deal of enthusiasm, sing campaign songs, decide Portland and make all of the noise they can at their rallies at night. He reported, however, that the organization had not been as effective as that of the Portland Association.

George L. Baker spoke yesterday at the rally. Among other things he told the workers: "Everybody in Portland knows that what the rally is all about is to get the Y. M. C. A. to give a man a broader view of life, it prepares him for better things, trains him in efficiency and increases his value. He said the campaign was showing the people of the city the true value of associational work."

Dr. E. A. A. president of the State Board of Health, was the speaker of the day. He said that associational work gives opportunity and concentration. He declared that for the young man without a definite object in life, it was a magnet that would straighten out and correct his course.

A toast in "Roll Run" was given to H. W. Stone, general secretary, and Mrs. Stone. Several members of the Baker Stock Company are present and gave a short entertainment.

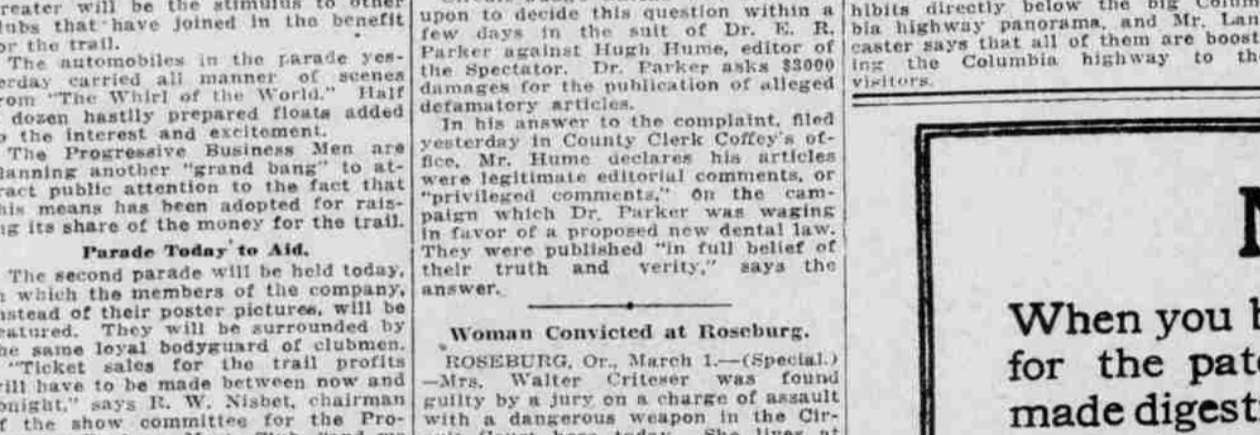
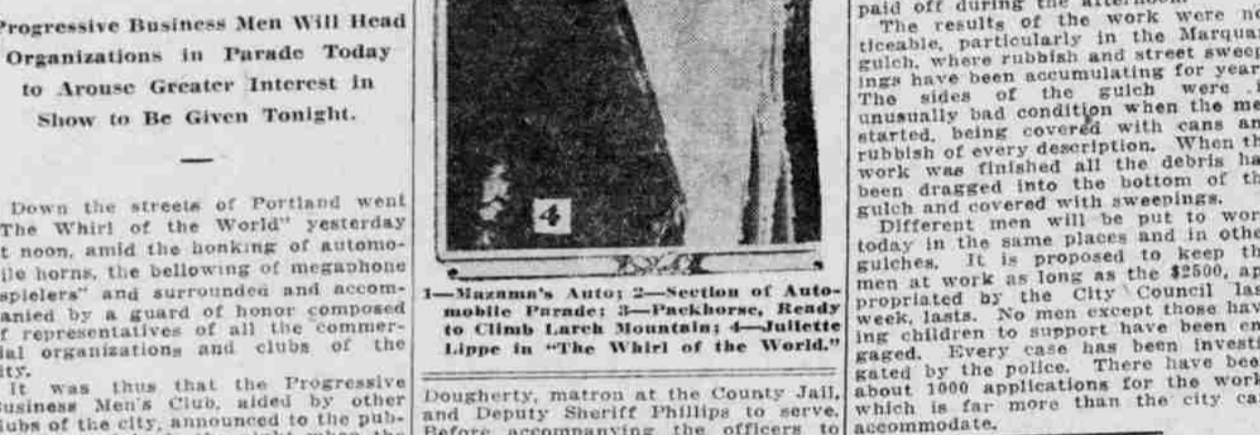

## CLUBS MARCH TO AID

"The Whirl of the World" Is Heralded Over City.

## LARCH FUND TO BENEFIT

Progressive Business Men Will Head Organizations in Parade Today to Arouse Greater Interest in Show to Be Given Tonight.

Down the streets of Portland went "The Whirl of the World" yesterday at noon, amid the honking of automobiles, the blowing of megaphones, "speakers" and surrounded and accompanied by a guard of honor composed of representatives of all the commercial organizations and clubs of the city.

It was thus that the Progressive Business Men's Club, aided by other clubs of the city, announced to the public that tonight is the night when the parade of the proposed trail to the summit of Larch Mountain, which the Progressive Business Men's Club has bought out the house for this opening performance tonight and expects to clear at least \$1000 to turn into the fund for the "Whirl of the World" will run the remainder of the week, with matinees on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday. The rumors that the parade show are to the effect that it plays all week to packed houses.

**Clubs Are After Record.**  
The Progressive Business Men are going to try to make the opening night the absolute record-breaker for the whole season. The greater the success tonight the greater the fund that will be available for the trail and the greater will be the stimulus to other clubs that have joined in the benefit for the trail.

The automobiles in the parade yesterday carried all manner of scenes from "The Whirl of the World." Half a dozen hastily prepared floats added to the interest and excitement.

The Progressive Business Men are planning another "grand bang" to attract public attention to the fact that this means has been adopted for raising its share of the money for the trail.

**Parade Today to Aid.**  
The second parade will be held today, in which the members of the company, instead of their poster pictures, will be featured. They will be surrounded by the same loyal bodyguard of clubmen and sales for the trail profits will have to be made between now and tonight," says R. W. Nisbet, chairman of the show committee for the Progressive Business Men's Club, "and we want to bring the thing so strongly to the attention of the public that everybody in Portland will feel it his or her bounden duty to make an effort to help us on our enterprise. Incidentally, if they help us by getting a ticket to 'The Whirl of the World,' they are going to get their full money's worth, as well as help build the great trail from the Columbia Highway to Larch Mountain."

"The Whirl of the World" is one of the most elaborate musical productions that ever has visited the West. It carries a great amount of scenery and incidents in its cast such as stars as Howard brothers, Juliette Lippe and Texas Guinan.

## MRS. CLARK ARRESTED

INSANITY CHARGE FOLLOWS SERIES OF LIBEL SUITS.

Complaint Made by Gus H. Yungeburg, Who Fears Woman May Injure Herself or Someone Else.

Mrs. Marcella Clark, whose suit to annul A. E. Clark's divorce decree was thrown out of court by Circuit Judge McGinn a week ago, was arrested yesterday for insanity on a warrant issued by County Judge Cleeton. Her examination was postponed for a few days on her representation that she is suffering from injuries which she says she received in a streetcar accident.

Mrs. Clark's arrest followed a series of libel suits brought by her against prominent Portland men and women, most of whom she declared were in league with her former husband, and had circulated false reports about her. The warrant issued yesterday morning by Judge Cleeton was sworn to by Gus H. Yungeburg, who was appointed to watch her last Summer when she was released from a previous insanity charge. Yungeburg reported that Mrs. Clark was becoming violent and might harm herself or someone else.

## 90 IDLE AID CLEANUP

Family Men Win Relief by Work in Gulches.

## DIRT USED OVER RUBBISH

Unightly Trash Covered by Street Sweepings—New Crew Goes On Today—Council to Continue Plan While Fund Lasts.

Unightly rubbish in Marquam gulch and in gulches on the East Side disappeared fast yesterday when 90 unemployed men with families were put to work by the city cleaning up. The work, which was in the nature of "relief labor," was under the direction of Alex Donaldson, superintendent of the street-cleaning and sprinkling bureau. He reported that every man employed earned his \$3 for the day. They were paid off during the afternoon.

The results of the work were noticeable, particularly in the Marquam gulch, where rubbish and street sweepings have been accumulating for years. The sides of the gulch were in the usual bad condition when the men started, being covered with cans and rubbish of every description. When the work was finished all the debris had been dragged into the bottom of the gulch and covered with sweepings.

Different men will be put to work today in the same places and in other gulches. It is proposed to keep the men at work as long as the \$2500, appropriated by the City Council last week, lasts. No man except those having children to support have been engaged. Every case has been investigated by the police. There have been about 1000 applications for the work, which is far more than the city can accommodate.

## PANORAMA EXHIBIT LAUDED

S. C. Lancaster, Engineer on Highway, Is Back From Fair.

S. C. Lancaster, consulting engineer on the Columbia highway, returned yesterday from San Francisco, praising Oregon's as one of the most attractive exhibits in the Palace of Transportation in the great panoramic view of the Columbia highway, by the right of the east entrance.

The painting is 15 feet high by 198 feet long, and presents, besides a panoramic view of the great highway, several big detail paintings of beauty spots along the route.

Five automobile companies have exhibited directly below the big Columbia highway panorama, and Mr. Lancaster says that all of them are boosting the Columbia highway to the victors.

## EDITOR ANSWERS IN SUIT

Hugh Hume Declares Criticisms of Dr. Parker "Privileged Comment."

"What is legitimate editorial comment?" Circuit Judge Gatens will be called upon to decide this question within a few days in the suit of Dr. E. H. Parker against Hugh Hume, editor of the Spectator. Dr. Parker asks \$3000 damages for the publication of alleged defamatory articles.

In his answer to the complaint, filed yesterday in County Clerk Coffey's office, Mr. Hume declares his articles were legitimate editorial comments, or "privileged comments," on the campaign which Dr. Parker was waging in favor of a proposed new dental law. They were published "in full belief of the truth and verity," says the answer.

## Woman Convicted at Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Or., March 1.—(Special.)—Mrs. Walter Critser was found guilty by a jury on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon in the Circuit Court here today. She lives at West Fork. Another jury found Frank Langenberg, of Roseburg, guilty on a charge of giving liquor to minor girls. Both defendants will be sentenced Wednesday.

## 2 UNION MEN INDICTED

GRAND JURY CHARGES ARSON ON MENEFE COMPANY PLANT.

Thomas Patterson and Hugh Priest in Jail—Phosphorus Said to Have Been Used at Mill.

The two men are said to have come to Portland on February 1, when the Portland mill opened. Previously they had worked in Port Angeles, Wash.

Evidence discovered after the fire showed that the blaze had been set with phosphorus. A bottle with a little of this deadly substance remaining in it was found in the rooms of Patterson and Priest the following day.

Both men had been excused from work on February 17, pleading illness. It was found that Priest's hands were badly burned, apparently by some sort of acid. Two pairs of gloves, with the fingers eaten out by phosphorus, were also found in their rooms.

The indictment returned against the two men charges arson at night, for which the penalty is from 5 to 15 years in the Penitentiary. Arson in the day-time calls for a sentence of three to ten years.

Deputy District Attorney Collier declared yesterday that he would attempt to learn where Patterson and Priest had obtained the phosphorus.

Auditor Errs 10 Cents.  
In handling \$6,752,952.96 in 46,000 separate transactions in 1914, the office of the City Auditor made only one mistake involving 10 cents, according to expert accountants who have just finished a complete check of the city's books.

The report, which was made to Auditor Barber, shows that the average of each of the 46,000 checks or warrants made out was less than \$150. They ran as low as 10 cents and as high as several thousand dollars. In the transactions involving the paying of all employees and the paying of all municipal claims the only mistake made was in one warrant which was made out for \$5.15 when it should have been \$5.05.
