Tab Kept by Traffic Experts on 247 Machines Crossing Bridges in 8 Hours.

337 CARS USED IN SERVICE

Tabulations Gathered for Counci Show Increased Congestion on Streets and Heavier Use of Spans Over River.

Two hundred and forty-seven jitney automobile and buses crossing the bridges over the Willamette River take in an average of \$2.57 each in an eight-hour day, according to the results shown in a study of the jitney busi-ness just completed by Municipal Traf-tic Engineer Kirkpatrick. The figures regarding earnings and many other interesting facts and figures were leaved by a carrie of traffic experts ricaned by a corps of traffic experts who passed several days on the bridges keeping absolute tab on the jitneys.

The study in tabulated form was presented yesterday to Commissioner Dieck and will be sent by him to the

The investigations show that there are now 337 jitneys in Portland. It is said the carnings as shown for the 247 said the carnings as shown for the 24' cars crossing the bridges is a fair average for all the jitneys. There are about 30 cars in the jitney service that so not cross the bridges. It is estimated that the jitneys are cutting into the streetcar revenue to the extent of about \$866 in an eight-hour day. To

bout 3886 in an eight-hour day. To the \$2.57 the jitneys are operating on an average of about 32 miles a day. Jitneys Checked Up on Bridge. The figures as given do not mean that no jitney is earning more than \$2.57 in an eight-hour day. It means that that amount is the average taking everything into consideration. In many cases a car operates only a few hours in a day. Inasmuch as the city proposes to deal with the jitneys as a whole instead of singly the figures are considered important. It is said Fortland is the first city to make such a study of the new street transporta-

Portland is the first city to make such a study of the new street transportation business.

Traffic experts, stationed on the bridges, counted the jitneys crossing as well as the number of passengers in each car. Careful check was made of these. In this investigation and a subsequent investigation on the West Side the number, description, name of the driver and complete data of importance in identifying jitneys, was secured by the experts.

Every jitney in the city was listed. The list shows the exact number of hours the car is being operated and the amount of money being taken in.

Congestion Treated as Problem.

Remarkable increases in traffic on the bridges and on the streets of the business district on the West Side are

business district on the West Side are shown in the report. Jitneys passing Fifth and Washington streets between

skown in the report. Jitneys passing Fifth and Washington streets between 8 A. M. and 4 P. M. are estimated at 12,466. This, together with 1476 automobiles not in the Jitney service indicates an increase in traffic over the corresponding date in 1914 of 1912 wehleles or 236 per cent.

"I desire to call your attention to the total increase in automobile and general traffic respectively," says Mr. Kirkpatrick in his report. "This increase does not necessarily cause any great amount of congestion on the bridges, but the influx of the transfer routes with the West Side lines causes a congestion throughout the business district which I consider a serious problem."

The report shows that on the Broadway bridge the Jitneys have caused a 23 per cent increase in traffic. Twenty-seven jitneys of which one is a bus, operate over this bridge. In an eighthour day they carry 977 passengers or an average of 36.1 passengers for each jitney. In an hour there are 33 jitneys cross the bridge. In the same time, there are 52 streetcars carrying a total of \$230 passengers.
