PARSPORTS TO CANADA GOOD.—Contrary to recent reports current in various parts of the United States, citizens of this country will not be required to secure passports when visiting or pass-ing through Canada. Government offi-cials at Ottawa have advised that the present war will have no effect what-soever on the practices in this parti-cular.
