The "mobilisation" of the forces in the membership campaign at the Commercial Club dining-room yesterday to receive preparatory instructions for their work, gave an excellent indication of the widespread enthusiasm that the new Chamber has already aroused among the business men of the city.

Many of the workers who are to participate in the membership campaign were not themselves members of the commercial organizations of the city before the consolidation movement was

before the consolidation movement was commenced, but among them one could see the same eager scal that was mani-fested by the members who have been allied with the organization for years.

"This is the largest turnout for the preliminary meeting to a membership campaign that I have seen in any of the cities in which I have worked," declared H. V. Chase, who is handling the consolidation campaign. "The biggest crowd that I ever saw before on a similar occasion was 250 committeemen."
