ROAD ISSUE TO MAKE 200,000 ACRES TILLABLE, ARGUED. Dr. G. H. Douglas Tells Club at Multnomah \$1000 a Year a Mile on 70 Miles of Road Can Be Saved.

That the adoption of the \$1,250,000 road bond issue by Multnomah County would permit the cultivation of 200,000 acres of now undeveloped land, and that \$1900 annual expense for the upkeep of each of the 70 miles of roadway could be saved to the county by building hard-surface roads, was asserted by Dr. G.
