WOOL MARKET SLOW IN OPENING Shearing Now Under Way in Eastern Ore-

gon-General Market Conditions. Wool shearing is under way at a number f points in Eastern Oregon this week, but the market continues quiet, no actual transfers being reported. Inactive conditions revail elsewhere in the West. Commenting in the general wool situation, the Boston commercial Bulletin says;

Manufacturers have been looking around considerably and have taken sample bugs of new Arizonas and other wools, but actual trading has not been heavy; "In consequence of the lessened demand

of the past two or three weeks wools which had reached an unduly high level, which was out of proportion with prices for other wools, have shown a further weakening ten-dency. But negwithstanding the comparative duliness, prices, except on the particu-iar wools just mentioned, have been steady and there seems to be fairly general agree-ment that under the surface the market is ment that under the surface the market is still fairly strong. However, this point of view is not entertained by all the trade and there are those who seem to think that wool has touched the high point, at least for some time.

A libel was filed Tuesday in Federal Court by Deputy United States District Attorney Rankin whereby the Government selved 72 packages of food pasts, similar to spaghetti, shipped by the Vezuvio & Piedmont Paste Company, of San Francisco and Oakland, Cal., it be ing charged that the labels on the goods amounted to misbranding.

Labels used are said to be cless imitations of those used on foreign manufactured paste and a misleading impression is said to be conveyed by the California company, although in small type at the bottom it is stated the company at the bottom it is stated the company's headquarters are in California. The use of such labels is said to be in violation of the food and drugs act of 1906, and action was taken locally upon advices from the Secretary of Agriculture.

United States Marshal Montag's offices sent an officer to Astoria resterday to seize the contraband foodstuffs, which had been consigned to a merchant of that city and shipped from San Francisco on the steamer Yosomite, of the E. J. Dodge & Co. steamship line. The manufacturers of the paste will be required to come into court and show that the labels used are not misleading. Failing in this, the Government will confiscate the goods and impose a penalty for misrepre-sentation.

CHICAGO, April 7.—Rains that allayed fear of drouth damage started the wheat market today on a decline, which was emphasized later by the Government crop report and by rumors that Austria had sued for peace. The close was heavy at a loss of 1%c to 2c net. Corn finished &c down, oats off %c to %c and provisions varying from a setback of 5c to a rise of 2%c. Moisture over nearly the entire West, with predictions of ample showers where needed further East, put an end at once to dry weather talk and brought about immediate selling pressure on wheat. Something of a

Something of a reaction ensued, but the Government crop report turned out to be about as bearish as expected, and the bulls again withdrew support. Absence of any important new export demand for wheat attracted considerable notice in view of the acknowledged shortage across the Atlantic.

Corn eased off with wheat and as a result of improved weather conditions. Most of the trade was between pit speculators.

Oats were relatively firm, owing to seaboard buying of the May delivery. In addition, there were cash sales here of 200,000 bushels, chieffy for export.
