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LAW SCHOOL IS TO STAY

FRESHMEN ALREADY ENROLLED TO GET UNIVERSITY DIPLOMAS. Course to Be Enlarged, With Same Faculty, After Removal of Department, Announces Dean.

Although the University of Oregon law department will be removed to Eugene, the same school, except for a change of name, will continue to operate in Portland, was the announcement made to the classes last night by Circuit Judge Gantenbein, dean of the law school.

Arrangements have been made with the university faculty whereby freshmen enrolled in the school in Portland may complete their studies here and receive a University of Oregon diploma at the end of their course, said Judge Gantenbein.

Not only will the present school continue with the same faculty, said the Judge, but the course will be somewhat enlarged. Instruction will continue for 26 weeks in the year instead of 28 weeks and there will be six instead of three lectures each week.

The law department conducted in Portland, said Judge Gantenbein, "was organized 21 years ago with an appropriation of \$800 a year, when the university itself was receiving only \$20,000 annually from the state.
