That Portland municipal bonds are extremely good in the financial world is apparent from the receipt yesterday of a bid of 1.65 per cent above par for an issue of \$100,000 in 4 1/2 per cent 30-year dock bonds. The bid was submitted by Zetabrook & Co., bond buyers of Chicago. The bid means that the city will receive a premium of \$1650 on the issue.
