Portland Loads Cereal on 90 Ships

# During Ten Months of Season.

Of 132 grain ships loaded at Portland and on Fuget Sound for 10 months of the 1914-15 season, there were 90 dis-patched from this port and 42 from the

the 1914-19 Season, there were 90 dis-patched from this port and 42 from the northern harbor, according to a statisti-cal report issued yesterday by Brown & McCabe, stevedores, who say they loaded 114 of the carriers. In the list were 71 British vessels, 31 Norwegians, 7 Russians, 1 Belgian, 3 Americans, 1 Swedish, 13 Frenchmen, 1 Dutch and 2 Italians. The carriers mentioned do not include liners or other ships, simply vessels engaged in the transportation of cereal cargoes. It is not thought that there will be to ex-ceed half a dozen grain ships dispatched during May and June from both dis-tricts, as the exporting period is vir-tually at an end because of the inability of exporters to obtain tonnage with which to move wheat and flour remain-ing that can be sold if delivery could be guaranteed.






