

DOCTORS GO TO WAR

Two Known in Portland to Care for Wounded.

ONE IN CHARGE OF UNIT

Dr. Albert Goodman to Go to Tapanne Hospital, in Belgium, and Dr. Richard Nunn, on Way to Work in Britain.

The war in Europe continues to draw on American talent, especially in the medical world, the latest recruits whose mission abroad is of interest to Portland residents being Dr. Albert Goodman, formerly of Portland, son of Mrs. Jeanette Goodman, of the Norton Hotel, and Dr. Richard Nunn, who for 25 years or more has been identified with Portland. Dr. Goodman goes from service in Mexico to Belgium, where he will take up duties with the American Red Cross, and Dr. Nunn will go direct to England for work in the hospitals.

Doctor Heads Party.

Dr. Goodman left on the steamer St. Louis from New York City some time ago. He is accompanied by physicians and 24 nurses, of which he is to be in charge.

Dr. Goodman received his early education in Portland, and his family still lives here. He is a brother of Miss T. Rose Goodman and Miss Esther Goodman. He is a graduate of Columbia University and during the war the American soldiers went to Vera Cruz recently Dr. Goodman was put in charge of the hospital of the American Red Cross there.

Dr. Nunn to Go to England.

Dr. Richard Nunn, who has been a resident of Portland for about 25 years, left Friday evening for Washington, D. C. After securing his reports there, he will go to New York City and take an American line steamer for England.
