Willamette Association Hears
Reports of Progress in
Practically All Fields.

HISTORICAL BUREAU PLAN

Records of Early Sessions to Be
Gathered if Resolution Adopted.
Other Meetings and Gigantic
Rally on Programme.

The 67th annual session of the Willamette Baptist Association convened yesterday in the Montavilla Grace Baptist Church. A resolution was presented to amend the constitution to enable the establishment of a historical department under the supervision of a special secretary. This action was suggested by Rev. O. C. Wright and by the presence of Mrs. Sarah Matlock, a pioneer, who attended the meeting of the association in 1848 and still has the minutes of that session, which will be read at the rally Thursday night at the White Temple. It was announced that "Father" J. F. Patton, who has been with the association almost from the beginning, will deliver a sketch of the work of the association at this rally. This rally will be the 49th anniversary of the founding of the First Baptist Church.

Encouraging Reports Heard.
Flattering reports were read yesterday morning from all the Baptist churches connected with the association. Portland First Church reported a membership of 2484 and still has the minutes of that session, which will be read at the rally Thursday night at the White Temple. It was announced that "Father" J. F. Patton, who has been with the association almost from the beginning, will deliver a sketch of the work of the association at this rally. This rally will be the 49th anniversary of the founding of the First Baptist Church.

East Forty-fifth-street Church reported an increase in membership and the accumulation of a building fund of \$2022.50, with the assistance of all the departments of the church. A new building is soon to be built. Highland Baptist Church reported its debt paid and a new pastor installed. Rev. C. F. Mielr. An every-member canvass was made. Membership was given as 256 and the Sunday school at 175.

Sellwood Builds Addition.
At Sellwood Baptist Church two new classrooms are being built. Third Church reported that it is free of debt and plans have been adopted for an addition. Membership was reported as 296. The resignation of Rev. H. C. Saxton of the University Church, was reported. The East Side Church, Rev. W. O. Shanks, showed progress. Its membership was given as 339.

Rev. T. A. Leonard, Rev. Wesley J. Beaven and Rev. F. H. Haynes were appointed a committee to arrange for the membership contest for the silver cup which will be presented to the winner at the rally Thursday night. It will go to the church that has the largest attendance in proportion to its membership. A report of the work of the West and East Side Italian missions indicated a decided activity. Rev. Walter Duff, of Calvary Church, delivered the doctrinal sermon.

Woman's Work is Discussed.
The woman's session was held yesterday, with Mrs. W. B. Hinson presiding. Reports were made by Mrs. N. S. Wood, Miss Ruby Weyburn, Mrs. W. H. Hurlburt, Mrs. George McInnis, Mrs. C. A. Brodie, with an address by Miss Harriette Cooper. At night a rally and platform meeting were held. Dr. Hinson delivered the address.

"What Next?" was the subject of the address today by R. P. Hutton, of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, and "Christian Education" will be presented by Rev. Myron W. Haynes, of McMinnville. The missionary societies will meet this afternoon.
The rally tomorrow night at the White Temple will be the big event of the session. There will be rollicks of churches and missions by Secretary Wright. Each church and mission will respond, giving the number of membership and the number present at the rally. Rev. C. A. Wooddy will present the silver cup to the church that makes the best report.

BANKS GAIN AND LOSE

STATEMENTS TO CONTROLLER SHOW
\$600,000 DEPOSIT DECREASE.

Loans and Discounts Are Indicated as
About \$42,000,000 in Estimate
for 15 Houses.

Some Portland banks show gains and others losses in deposits in their statements, issued in response to the call of the Controller of the Currency for statistics on their condition May 1, as compared with the nearest statement last year, which was in June 30. For the past year Portland banks show a loss in deposits of about \$300,000.

This is not regarded by Portland bankers as anything but what might have been expected, however, and many express surprise that the loss is so light, considering the period of stress that has come since last June. At that time there was no war in Europe, and the rumble of the approaching conflict had not yet had its effect upon industrial or banking conditions.

Combined resources of 15 Portland banks are in the neighborhood of \$42,000,000, as disclosed in their statements. Deposits approximate \$26,000,000, while loans and discounts are about \$42,000,000. Banks reporting yesterday showed the following deposits: Laid & Tilton, \$12,388,285.88; First National, \$17,271,778.52; United States National, \$9,873,197.07; Security Savings, \$3,710,088; Lumbermen, \$5,342,135.79; Bank of California, \$4,260,361.83; Canadian, \$2,334,156.06; Merchants, \$546,781.78; Northwestern, \$1,862,522.52; Scandinavian-American, \$1,523,855.84; George W. Bates, \$683,058.82; Citizens, \$606,886.91; East Side, \$117,689.59; Bank of Sellwood, \$15,138,552.

BALLOTING SOON TO BEGIN

Thirteen candidates for Queen of the Rose Festival are now in the field. When there are 15 candidates the Festival Board expects to arrange for the beginning of the balloting. SALE OF BOUNTY PAID ON HEADS

Collector Says They Are From
Hawks and is Arrested.
LEBANON, Pa., April 27.—William Stock, of York, is in the Lebanon jail under 42 charges of perjury and false pretense arising from his alleged action of passing off on Lebanon Aldermen and Justices of the Peace chicken heads for hawks, rabbit heads for those of young foxes and rat heads for those of weasels, and collecting state bounties amounting to \$612.
Stock began his operations here early in 1914 and was successful for a time, but he made a fatal mistake when he selected as the date for his alleged biggest capture in Union Township the night of a severe storm.
Clerk R. B. Light, of the County Commissioners, had been suspicious of Stock's claims against the county and had sent forth a warning to Aldermen and justices to be sure of the identity of the heads produced by Stock. After a consultation with the County Commissioners, they finally refused to pay Stock's last claim of \$284 and caused his arrest.
