Contributing Factors to Rural Prosperity Much in Evidence at Maryhill.

NOTABLE MEN IN PARTY

MARYHILL, Wash., May 5.—(Special.)

Road Construction Labeled.

A big battery of waiting automobiles whizzed the visitors in many directions as soon as the excursion steamed ashore. Some went to Goldendale, 21 miles away; others traveled over Mr. Hill's model highways, through great fields of growing grain and through a series of wonderful orchards in various stages of development. For the convenience of his visitors Mr. Hill had great black-and-white signs painted and posted at prominent points along the road to indicate the type of construction used in each of them.

Mr. Hill had a number of automobiles at the disposal of his guests and made every effort to provide pleasure and entertainment for them.
