

AUTO SETS RECORD FOR 15-MILE RACE

Jimmie Parsons Makes Run in 13 Minutes and 45 Seconds.

RAIN EARLY CALLS HALT

Portland Motorist Breaks Track Mark and Establishes New Northwest Record for Dirt Course—Schneider Second.

START OF 15-MILE CLASS "A" EVENT YESTERDAY IN WHICH PARSONS MADE NEW TRACK AND NORTHWEST RECORD, 13 MINUTES 45 SECONDS.

One thousand race lovers who braved their way to the Rose City Speedway yesterday saw a new track and Northwest record established in the 15-mile class "A" event and witnessed another race and a third before a drenching rain flashed the crepe sign on proceedings.

Jimmie Parsons came back yesterday in grand style by winning his first race in Oregon. What is said by the leading race authorities to be a record for the Portland track and for dirt mile tracks in the Northwest. His Parsons Special did the 15 miles of the class "A" standing start event in 13 minutes and 45 seconds, according to the watchmen held in the hands of Earl E. Watkins and Ernest Schneider.

The Schneider Special made the sixth lap of this race in 25 seconds, the fastest time of the day. The 11th lap was done by Parsons in 53, the 13th in 53 1/2 and the second and eighth laps in 54 1/2. The other cars were—The Parsons, Gordon and Schneider specials—and all three were bunched closely throughout the going.

Parsons Sprints to Lead. The yellow Schneider car jumped into the lead at the start and led until the eighth lap, when Parsons dove ahead for the remainder of the race, with the Schneider car second and the other cars that point forward.

After Parsons nosed Frank Elliott and the Golden Special out of second place in the fifth lap the Gordon Special, which led all the way through, late in the race the Schneider Special was hitting on "three gears" only.

The Romano Special, which started at the races May 1 and 2, got a round cheer when it limped on the track just before the class "A" event was called, but it was not in shape to enter. While returning from the Salem track yesterday it broke a pin in its crank shaft and also sprung its front axle.

E. V. Forbes, the Portland boy, fooled folks badly with his Buick in the class "B" handicap race. Given an advantage of 30 seconds over Harry Stratton's Mercer and 50 seconds over Fred Bardsley's Veille, he led the entire field all the way and finished a full half lap ahead of the Veille, which had lapped all of the other cars in the race.

Banks' Pope Special and Billy Smith's Marmon also started at scratch with the Buick, but Forbes was too much for them. When he saw he couldn't do any better than second place he slowed his Veille down and was content to remain a comfortable distance ahead of the slower cars. He was in second place from the eighth lap on. The Pope Special finished third and the Mercer fourth. The winning Buick covered the ten miles in 14 and a second.

Rain Halts Races. Just as the third race, class "B" 15-mile handicap, was called the weather man broke his promise and it wasn't long until the track was heavily with water.

While the Pope Special, with Ray Biand up, led the procession across the tape in the 1000-yard race, Forbes and E. L. Keats called a double postponement after ordered the racers and crowd home. At the end of the fifth lap the Veille pulled in second place and Forbes' Buick third.

The big cards of the day, the Rose City Festival event for the 25-mile road race and the 1000-yard race, were postponed until the morning. The 1000-yard race was not attempted. When the cars first appeared on the track yesterday the course was still wet because of the morning rain.

An hour's wait most of the track was in good condition and the races went ahead until the heavy fall came about 4 o'clock. There was hardly enough money within the gates to pay the expenses of the day's programme, but Manager DeLoe had a fine time of it.

Because of the bad condition of the track all along the three-quarters mile track was necessary to the race that no cars could pass on that strip.

In the hope of keeping the "tight-wads" off the hills and the stands, large strips of canvas had been erected, but the wind and rain blew them down a sufficient distance to give the rubber-necks a pretty fair view of the meet.

Most of the race cars will leave Portland within the next few days to compete in the races at Spokane Monday and Tuesday of next week.

YELOBANS SWAMP DENTISTS

McMinville Nine Makes Farcic of Game With Visitors.

McMINVILLE, Or., May 9.—(Special.)—The seventh straight victory for the Yelobans of McMinville was registered in the game at Spokane Monday when they whipped the Union Dentists, 25 to 10.

The visitors employed five men for pitching duty. The Yelobans got 15 hits, six stolen bases and considerable batting practice.
