The Ministerial Association of the Methodist churches of the Portland district will meet tomorrow and Thursday in the Methodist Church at St. Helens.

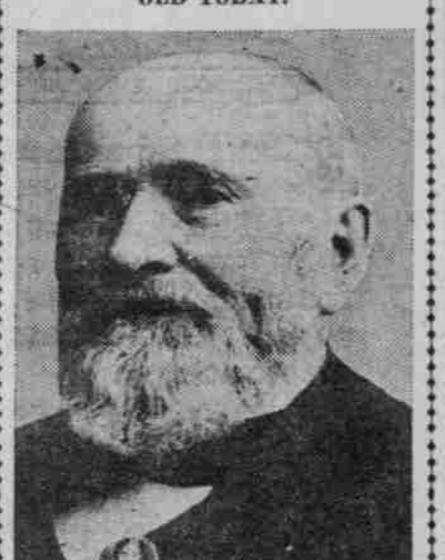
