

81 ATHLETES ENTER HIGH SCHOOL MEET

Best Academic Stars of Entire State Chosen by University of Oregon.

PORTLAND TEAMS LARGEST TRYOUTS TO BE HELD AT EUGENE SATURDAY MORNING AND FINALS IN AFTERNOON—31 HIGH SCHOOLS REPRESENTED AT GAMES.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 12.—(Special.)—The names of 81 preparatory track athletes have been passed on by the committee on entries at the university and they will participate all day Saturday for the state title. A competitive record scale was used to determine the men who would be permitted to represent their high schools in this meet; as a result the best and fastest material will be present.

Portland high schools and Pendleton lead in the largest number of representatives. Washington High, Portland, will send eight athletes, Lincoln six, Columbia five, Jefferson six and Pendleton six. Dope favors Washington to win the meet by virtue of their large entry.
