Happy was generally beloved by all ball lovers, not alone for his fighting picturesqueness, but for his general good nature and ready tongue backed up by a resourceful head.

Longest Service Record Held. Hogan, at the time of his death, wa the oldest ballplayer in the Pacific Coast League in point of actual service. Norman Brashear and Georgs Wheeler stuck with him until almost the end, but both dropped out of Coast ball be-




