

# RUSSIA LOOKS TO ALLIES FOR RELIEF

Entire Army Corps Are Moved by Germans From France to Eastern Front.

## NEW BATTLES DEVELOPING

Petrograd Says Invaders of Baltic Provinces on Defensive and Desperate Efforts Are Made by Teutons to Cross San.

LONDON, May 18.—On the extent of the pressure brought by the new offensive of the allies in France and Belgium on the Germans depends the further success of the Austro-German assaults on the Russians in Courland, Poland and Galicia, it is believed by military observers here in view of recent dispatches from Petrograd. These declare that heavy reinforcements have been brought recently to the eastern war zone from the Western fronts.

Entire army corps and separate divisions have been moved from France and Belgium to the Baltic provinces and Galician front, according to the Petrograd report, which adds that completion of the plan evidently had been interrupted by the renewed activity of the allies in the west.

San Not Crossed by Teutons. The report declares that the Germans have been put on the defensive in the Baltic provinces.

Desperate efforts are being made by the Austro-Germans to cross the River San in Galicia, says one Russian dispatch, which adds that the enemy has not even gotten within striking distance of Jaroslau and other fortresses that form the strongest Russian line of defense. The Austrian official dispatch issued May 15 said the Teuton allies had captured Jaroslau. The Berlin official report of today says fighting for a passage across the San is still in progress.

A terrific battle is under way north of Przemysl, for possession of the Russian fortifications along the River San. Another big battle has been going on since early yesterday near Lwow and Lagow and in the vicinity of Stry, says the Berlin dispatch.

Austrian Railroad Captured. The Russian War Office conveys a further report in Russia of the capture of the Pilleca and Vistula rivers, on part of the long front over which they have been compelled by the Austro-German armies to fall back.

The railroad line between Kolomea and Delatyn, which has been of great importance to the Austrians for maintaining communication with their base in Bukovina, is reported today to be in Russian hands. It has been defended stubbornly by the Austrians. The evacuation by the Russians of their positions in the Carpathians became inevitable as the Germans proceeded with their powerful drive from Cracow upon the Russian right. This threatened the cutting off of the whole Carpathian army of the Russians, whose rear communications were only narrow foot paths. Russian critics hint that the Carpathian campaign was an unwise undertaking, since it led to a great extension of the front which was not easily defensible.

## PEACE PLAN IS SUGGESTED

Socialist Committee's Proposed Programme Sent to The Hague.

CHICAGO, May 18.—The peace programme devised by the National Committee of the Socialist party in pursuance of resolutions adopted here last week was committed yesterday to the national Peace Bureau at The Hague today. It provides:

Terms of peace at the close of the present war in Europe must be based on the following provisions: No indemnities; no transfers of territory except on the consent of the people inhabiting the territory; no countries under foreign rule to receive independence if demanded by the inhabitants of such countries; an international congress with permanent committees to consider international disputes; international ownership of strategic waters; neutralization of the seas; universal disarmament; abolition of manufacture of arms for private profit; no increase in existing armaments; no naval or military appropriations; political democracy; abolition of secret diplomacy; universal suffrage.

## Newberg Firm Suspends.

NEWBERG, Or., May 18.—(Special.)—The firm of Hodson Brothers, who give notice of suspension, is the oldest in its line in Newberg. For many years it has been supplying the people of Newberg and the surrounding country with clothing and men's furnishing goods. It is composed of J. C. and Charles A. Hodson, but the former went back to Indiana his native state, several months ago. Their father was an early settler in this vicinity and J. C. Hodson was superintendent of Newberg schools in former years. Another brother is a druggist in Newberg and the youngest son of the family is city engineer. Sealed bids for the stock have been advertised for and are to be opened next Monday.

## Roy Farnam Faces New Trial.

ROSEBURG, Or., May 18.—(Special.)—It was made practically certain here yesterday that Roy Farnam, serving a term in the penitentiary on a serious charge, will be tried for the murder of Edna Morgan, of Cow Creek Valley, during the May term of the Circuit Court. The charged body of Edna Morgan, 14 years old, was found in the ruins of the barn of H. H. Beamer, near Glendale, on December 9, 1914. Farnam was convicted of a statutory crime after three trials.

## NEW WARSHIP PROMISED

NOVEL TYPES SAID TO BE NOW IN MAKING ON CYLDE.

British Admiralty Makes Appeal for More Skilled Labor, Needed to Complete Vessels Under Way.

GLASGOW, May 18.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—That the shipyards on the Clyde are turning out several fighting ships of entirely new types which are expected to prove decisive factors, both in the North Sea and in the Dardanelles, was revealed in an address made to a meeting of business men here by Captain J. J. Bartlett, of the Admiralty office.

## COWLITZ CLOSING OPPOSED

Kelso Fishermen Ask Mr. Lister to Delay Action.

KELSO, Wash., May 18.—(Special.)—When Kelso fishermen learned that an effort is being made by fishing interests on the Columbia to secure action through the State Fish Board closing the Cowlitz River to commercial fishing, much indignation was aroused and plans are being laid to fight the proposition.

## NORTH SEA RULES CHANGED

British Admiralty Warns Neutrals to Get Permits to Sail.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—New Admiralty directions for navigation in the North Sea, designed to safeguard commerce from mine fields, were announced in a dispatch to the State Department today from Consul-General Skinner at London.

## PEACE WOMEN IN BERLIN

Plea for End of War to Be Made to German Government.

THE HAGUE, via London, May 18.—An embassy from the International Congress of Women, headed by Miss Jane Addams of Chicago, left the Dutch capital today for Berlin to intercede with Germany in favor of peace. The embassy, in addition to Miss Addams, comprises Dr. Aletta Jacobs and Mrs. Richard Paltche, of Holland, and Signora Genoni, of Italy.

## Railroad Buys 14,043 Cars.

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—Orders for 14,043 steel freight cars for replacement were placed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company today. This will represent an expenditure of approximately \$18,000,000.

## RAINS CHECK BATTLES

RELATIVE QUIET PREVAILS IN FLANDERS AND FRANCE.

French Say Germans Left 2000 Dead West of Canal—Berlin Tells of Heavy Losses to British.

LONDON, May 18.—The official reports from Paris today say that account of continuous rains and thick mist, operations have almost ceased in Flanders and France, even the cannonading being weak. Paris tells of finding 2000 German dead on the ground west of the Yser Canal taken by the allies Sunday and Tuesday. The official report from Berlin declares that on the eastern bank of the Yser Canal, fighting developed at some points and continues today.

## BIDS ON PAVING ASKED

Washington Seeks Offers to Build Pacific Highway Stretch.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 18.—(Special.)—The state highway department has advertised for bids to be opened June 14 for the construction of seven and one-half miles of the Pacific Highway in Clarke County, from the end of the present paving north of Vancouver toward La Center. The work is to include not only grading and draining, but also the surfacing of the new highway, which will eliminate what is now one of the worst stretches in the state on the Pacific Highway route. The estimated cost is \$65,000.
