RUSSIA LOOKS TO ALLIES FOR RELIEF

Entire Army Corps Are Moved by Germans From France to Eastern Front.

NEW BATTLES DEVELOPING

Petrograd Says Invaders of Baltic Provinces on Defensive and Desperate Efforts Are Made by Tentons to Cross San.

LONDON, May 13 .- On the extent of the pressure brought by the new offenon the Germans depends the further success of the Austro-German assaults on the Russians in Courland, Poland and Galicia, it is believed by military observers here in view of recent dis-putches from Petrograd. These declare that heavy reinforcements have been brought recently to the eastern war zone from the Western fronts.

Entire army corps and separate divisions have been moved from France and Belgium to the Baltic provinces and Galician front, according to the Petrograd report, which adds that completion of the plan evidently had been interrupted by the renewed activity of the allies in the west.

San Not Crossed by Tentons. The report declares that the Ger-

mans have been put on the defensive in the Baltic provinces. Desperate efforts are being made by the Austro-Germans to cross the river San in Galicia, says one Russian dispatch, which adds that the enemy has not even gotten within striking distance of Jaroslau and other fortresses that form the strongest Russian line of defense. The Austrian official dispatch issued May 15 said the Teuton allies had captured Jaroslau. The Berlin official report of today says fighting for a passage across the San is still in progress.

The evacuation by the Russians of their positions in the Carpathians became inevitable as the Germans proceeded with their powerful drive from Cracow upon the Russian right. This threatened the cutting off of the whole Carpathian army of the Russians whose rear communications were only narrow foot paths. Russian critics hint that the Carpathian campaign was an unwise undertaking, since it led to a great extension of the front which was not easily defendable.

British Admiralty Warns Neutrals to Get Permits to Sail.

WASHINGTON, May 18. - New Admirally directions for navigation in the North Sea, designed to safeguard commerce from mine fields, were an-nounced in a dispatch to the State De-partment today from Consul-General Skinner at London.

The announcement, dated yesterday and superseding the Admiralty's regulations of November 30, "strongly urges" shipmasters to obtain latest of-ficial notices before sailing from Brit-ish ports. Lights may be extinguished, it says, and other changes made with-out previous warning. Neutral vessels seeking to use the

North Sea routes are required to apply through their foreign representatives for permission.

GLASGOW, May 3 .- (Correspondent of the Associated Press.)—That the shipyards on the Clyde are turning out several fighting ships of entirely nev types which are expected to prove de cieive factors, both in the North Seand in the Dardanelles, was revealed in an address made to a meeting obusiness men here by Captain J. J. Barttelet, of the Admiralty office. In urging the necessity of recruiting several thousand skilled workmen for the ship-building works, he said:

BIDS ON PAVING ASKED

Washington Seeks Offers to Build Pacific Highway Stretch.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 18 .- (Special.) The state highway department has advertised for bids to be opened June 14 for the construction of seven and me-half miles of the Pacific Highway in Clarke County, from the end of the present paving north of Vancouver toward La Center. The work is to include not only grading and draining, but also the surfacing of the new high-way, which will eliminate what is now one of the worst stretches in the state on the Pacific Highway route. The estimated cost is \$65,000.

It is still uncertain whether Clarke County will build from the end of the state work with its permanent high-way funds. The old board of County Commissioners promised the state high-way department to expend \$40,000 on the Pacific Highway if the state would

the Pacific Highway is the spend \$60,000.

The highway department also has called for bids for June 14 for construction of a 468-foot steel cantilever bridge over the Cowlitz River at Mayfield, Lewis County, on the National Park highway, for which \$30,000 is a lighter.
