find that called for sour cream? It is as follows: Cream cake—One cup sugar, 2 1/2 cups flour, one cup thick sour cream, one teaspoon saleratus (put into the cream), two eggs.

Is saleratus soda? I used soda as I didn't know what saleratus was. The cake rose nicely and looked inviting, but it proved to be yellow brown and tough, so it was abandoned to the garbage can.

I think the chief trouble with the recipe you quote is that there is too much soda to be completely neutralized by the amount of acid in one cup of sour cream, consequently some would remain to give the characteristic yellow color and unappetizing flavor of all "over-soda-ed" mixtures.
