STABBING VICTIM BETTER. Eli Parker, Held on Own Recognition, Declares Cutting Accident. Eli Parker, who stabbed Albert E. Stone in the right side Friday at the Columbia Brick Works at Hogan's Station on the Estacada electric line, had a hearing before Justice Rollins Saturday. Parker was released on his own recognition pending the result of the wound. Stone's injury is painful, but is not considered dangerous. Stone is at his home at Preston Station under the care of Dr. H. H. Hughes. At the hearing before Justice Rollins Parker said Stone struck him over the eye with his left hand while Parker had a jack-knife in his hand whittling, and Stone was cut while Parker threw up his arms in self-defense. Several witnesses testified that Stone had been abusive to Parker Friday morning. Parker said that from the evidence given Parker suffered great provocation. However, he did not think the wound was caused accidentally, as asserted by Parker. Stone is a resident of Gresham. It is not expected that any further action will be taken. Stone yesterday was improving from his injury.
