These are the result of a hearing held August 28, 1914, that grew out of application made to the War Department by J. B. Ziegler for changes in the harbor lines, and the War Department is said to be now considering the recommendations of Colonel McKinstry, which were given out vesterday. stry, which were given out yesterday.

Colonel McKinstry refers to the Improvement of the channel between Portland and the sea, the fact the Port of Portland Commission has aided the project and expended large sums in both the Columbia and Williamette and is now engaged in the improve and is now engaged in the improve-ment of the latter channel, while the Government dredges have undertaken the Columbia River portion, all in connection with a project for a 40-foot channel on the bar and 30 feet in the river. The Port of Portland has expended \$3,787,000 and contributed expended \$3,87,000 and contributed \$20,000 toward the operation of United States dredges in the Columbia, while on the Columbia River entrance work the United States has expended \$13,-143,424 and the Port of Portland \$475,-000. The City of Portland, through the Commission of Public Docks, has expended \$2,500,000 on docks and waterfront facilities waterfront facilities.
