Boston Raises Its Pennant and Trims Phillies.

SENSATIONAL PLAYS MADE

First Game Taken, 3 to 2, Despite Willness of Tyler, but Second Ends 5 to 4, with Victors Using All Resources.

BOSTON, May 28.—The Boston Nationals today raised the world's championship pennant captured from Philadelphia Athletics last Fall, and observed the occasion by winning both games of a double-header from Philadelphia and moving into the first division.

The first game was won 5 to 2, notwithstanding Tyler's willness, Mudge's pitching with three men on bases broke a tie at the expense of Alexander, his former roommate.

The lead changed three times in the second game, which Boston won, 5 to 4, only by using every element of reserve strength. The lineup was so changed by pinch hitters during the rally in the ninth inning that an almost general readjustment was necessary when the team took the field in the ninth.
