RACE COURSE CHANGED

BAD PAVING AVOIDED IN NEW ROLLER MARATHON ROUTE.

Numbers to Be Fixed Securely on Each Skater's Back to Aid Judges in Checking Entries.

To make it easier for the 100 or more boys who will compete in The Oregonian's roller skate Marathon on June 10, a slight change has been made in the course. Two strips of bad pavement on Tenth street have been giving trouble to the youthful entries who have been practicing over the course. These have been eliminated. Instead of racing up Tenth street to Jackson as originally planned, the racers will turn west on Hall street to Eleventh, then south on Eleventh to College and east down College to Broadway, instead of down Jackson as in the original course. This eliminates the two bad strips of pavement and leaves the Breton.

The numbers are to be worn on the backs of the skaters. They will be given to those entered a few days before the race, when the boys will weigh in. The numbers are to be securely fastened on the bauk of the skater when he appears for the start at 4:30 on the afternoon of June 10. 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
