# SWORN IN BY BOARD

New School Director, After Canvass of Votes, Takes Oath and Goes to Work.

COMMITTEES ARE NAMED

Samuel P. Lockwood, newly elected School Director, was inducted into office yesterday at a special meeting of the School Board held for the purpose of canvassing the vote. The official count showed a difference of but a few votes from the first figures gathered on the result of the election. The totals approved by the Directors yesterday gave Dr. Ernest A. Sommer 2023 votes, as against 5284 for Mr. Lockwood. The new Director, was declared elected upon motion of Director Beach and he was sworn in by School Clerk and he was sworn in by School Clerk Thomas. Chairman Munly of the Board will continue as head of the directorate for another year. He announced his committees for the coming year at yes-terday's meeting as follows:

Because of parades that have been scheduled, in which it is desired that school children of the city participate, on June 28, July 7 and 15, Robert Krohn, physical director of the city schools will receive a salary for six weeks during the Summer in order that he may direct the children in the parades.
