LONG PANORAMA UNFOLDS

Great Stretch of City, Cascades, Peaks, Rivers and Farms Is Shown to Travelers Along New Fairmount Boulevard.

When convention visitors and tourists begin to pour into Portland in July they will have an opportunity to enjoy an excellent scenic automobile trip within easy reach of the city, and in very little time. Yesterday County Commissioner Holman, accompanied by two delegates from the Al Kader Shrine, traveled over the scenic route just to see what it looked like. Fairmount boulevard is the name of the road. From every foot of its three-mile circle, this road, 1000 feet in the air, gives an unparalleled view of the city and its environs, and the vast farming districts of Washington County.
