Mrs. Geddes Says She Told Mormon Bishop of Polygamous Marriage.

OLD TESTIMONY IS READ

OGDEN, Utah, June 23.—Transcripts of testimony given by Mrs. Margaret Geddes, when she appeared at Washington, D. C., in the course of the United States senatorial investigation as to polygamy in 1904, when a fight was made against the setting of records were introduced in court today.

In the course of the cross-examination Mrs. Geddes was asked if she did not attempt to conceal the fact that she answered a query as to whether "Mr. Eckols" was the father of her youngest child by saying "No."

In reply to questions, Mrs. Geddes rehearsed in detail love affairs with Mr. Eckols, who had already married two wives prior to the Mormon manifesto, and did not vary in any degree from yesterday's testimony concerning the ceremony of the "union of time," performed by an apostle of the Mormon Church in secret.

Many of the heirs of the late millionaire, particularly the sons and daughters of his first and only legal wife, Mrs. Bertha Eckols, were in the courtroom.
