

## TRIP IS ENJOYED BY ARTILLERY RESERVE

Oregon Guardsmen Prove by Marksmanship That They Are Adept With Guns.

### FLOATING TARGETS BROKEN

Eight Companies Return From Fort Stevens, Where They Report Regulars Aided Them and Gave Much Instruction.

"It was a fine trip and we are looking forward to next year," said the members of the Coast Artillery reserve companies, Oregon National Guard, in Portland yesterday afternoon and last night. "We went down to Fort Stevens, took over the batteries from the regulars, and busted up the floating targets way out to sea just like the professionals. We sure had a good time, but we delivered the goods." Many of the guardsmen were on the street last night and yesterday afternoon and their appearance in uniform in squads caused much comment.

Allowing for military enthusiasm on the part of the citizen soldiers the idea was gathered from talking with the members of the different companies that the officers and men had enjoyed the outing and had profited by it as well.

Men in olive drab uniforms, wearing the red artillery hat cords, were numerous in Portland yesterday. They were seen in groups at the railway stations and in the streets. There were many at the Y. M. C. A. and they patronized the places of amusement.

Officers Are Pleased. Officers of the Artillery Reserve were particularly enthusiastic about the encampment just ended. They went to Fort Stevens to accomplish certain work, and they had done well. That was a cause for satisfaction. The weather had been fine, the discipline had been excellent, the regulars had been cordial and helpful. All this was cause for congratulation.

It was cold down at the river mouth. The men had fires in their tents and gathered around the little stoves in the evening. At night they rolled in their blankets on straw-filled ticks on the tent floors. But that was field service, regular Army style, and they rather enjoyed the novelty.

Everybody was pleased at the record accomplished in firing the big guns and mortars. The citizen soldiers had done really good work and had been freely commended.

Men Expert With Big Guns. To learn where to build forts and how to build them and arm them, they said, that was the work of the regular Army. But the regulars were too few to man the forts in time of war. So they had volunteered to learn the details of handling the big weapons. Their record shows that they learned well in the short time allowed.

The eight companies arrived over the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The Eugene and Ashland companies left an hour later by the Oregon Electric line. At 8:15 P. M. the Cottage Grove company started for home. The Roseburg, Medford and Ashland companies remained in Portland until 1:15 this morning. The Eighth Company, under Captain Frank W. Wright, belongs in Portland.

### MILITARY BALL ENDS CAMP

Reserve Officers Entertained at Function at Post.

FORT STEVENS, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—As a grand finale of the encampment the Oregon Reserve officers were entertained by the regular Army officers, their families and friends at a masquerade masked ball given in the post gymnasium at Fort Stevens last night. Music was furnished by the Reserve Artillery band. The hall was beautifully decorated, varicolored electric lights were used effectively and the ante-rooms were banked with flowers.

Data obtained in the mortar firing is said to have lowered the scores of the Eugene companies. The most perfect shot, based on range calculations, was made by the Eighth Company, of Portland, with the 10-inch rifle.

### SUNDAY BAR IS RAIDED

PLACE RUN IN CONNECTION WITH DANCEHALL NEAR KENTON.

Police Surprise 250 Men, Women and Children, But Bartenders Escape During Disorder.

In a raid late yesterday on a dancehall located on a ranch near the city limits northwest of Kenton, P. M. Kendall, owner of the place, H. Alt-house and H. Neindorf were arrested, charged with selling liquor on Sunday. George Ahrens, in charge of the dancehall, was charged with conducting a disorderly house.

Four kegs of beer were brought in by the officers as evidence. Patrolmen Phillips and Ward made a descent upon the place at 4 o'clock yesterday and found about 250 men, women and children at the resort. A dance was in progress in one building, while two bartenders are said to have been dispensing liquid refreshments in an adjoining barroom.

A near riot was threatened and the two bartenders broke and ran. One was captured and Sheriff Hurlburt headed a delegation of deputies who swooped down upon the resort and further arrests followed and the beer kegs were seized.

Officers say a line of jitneys has been in operation to the dancehall carrying people from the city. Tickets were used by patrons in securing drinks instead of paying cash, this evidently being intended as a ruse to evade the law.

## JUVENILE COURT IS TO GET ASSISTANCE

Committee to Meet Today to Plan for Schools and Parents to Co-operate.

### EXHIBITION TO BE HELD

Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Body to Arrange for Display of Vacation Handiwork of Children.

To consider the best means for the schools and parent-teacher organizations to co-operate with the Juvenile Court, the committee appointed last week for that purpose will meet today at 4 o'clock in Judge Cleston's office. This committee was named at a mass meeting held in Library Hall last Thursday, when representatives of the Portland Parent-Teacher Association, the Grade Teachers' Association, the Principals' Association, the Portland Education Association and the Juvenile Court were present in large numbers. Judge Cleston, A. F. Richter, Mrs. Alva Lee Stephens, A. R. Draper and Miss Viola Orthschild were appointed to represent the various organizations in the conference.

Judge Cleston will appoint each principal of the Portland public schools a deputy Juvenile Court officer.

Committees to Co-operate. To co-operate with the principals there will be a committee in each district to handle all cases in a friendly, tactful way.

One of the strong movements started will be a back-to-the-home campaign. As one of the means of getting in touch with the children by keeping them interested during the vacation months and so keeping them out of mischief, the Oregon Congress of Mothers and the Portland Parent-Teacher Association have planned to hold an exposition of the handiwork of the children of Oregon next October.

The affair will be for the purpose of showing the skill, perseverance and ingenuity of the boys and girls. No one has to work, but the plan as outlined will doubtless create ambition among the youngsters and it is thought by Mrs. Alva Lee Stephens, president of the Parent-Teacher Association, will do away with a large amount of delinquency.

### State-Wide Campaign Planned.

The plan includes a state-wide campaign to encourage an exhibition of the work of the children in every community in Oregon, as follows:

1. County fair exhibits, in each county in state, managed by local fair associations.

2. Exhibitions in schoolhouses, managed by school authorities and local parent-teacher associations.

3. Each county and each parent-teacher association in the state making such exhibition at county fairs or in schoolhouses, requested to send the exhibits of such exhibitions, to Portland, Or., for a State Juvenile Exposition.

All entries will be judged by competent judges, who will award as first prize a blue ribbon and as second prize a red ribbon.

The departments include: Gardening, woodwork, toys, electrical and mechanical apparatus, printing, handicrafts, domestic science, domestic arts, millinery, models, pet, hand-made toys, playhouses, camp-fire, and other exhibits.

Counties and parent-teacher associations, intending to send exhibits to the Oregon Congress of Mothers, room 311, Court house, Portland, by September 1, so that arrangements may be made for a large enough place for the exposition. The advisory committee includes: W. F. Richter, John H. Boyd, H. W. Stone, L. R. Alderman.

The executive committee members are: Mrs. Arlene E. Feltz, Mrs. Alva Lee Stephens, Mrs. J. C. Elliott, King, and the contest is open to all boys and girls in Oregon, under 15 years of age. This exposition will include anything made by a boy or girl in the home. Exhibitors will be classified according to age:

Entry A, under 10 years of age.

Entry B, under 13 years of age.

Entry C, under 15 years of age.

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## HAITI IN TURMOIL

Washington Considers Entire Change of Policy.

### PESSIMISTIC VIEW TAKEN

American Commissioners Think It Almost Hopeless to Expect Order Unless Drastic Action Is Taken.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Turbulent conditions in Haiti have reached such a point that the United States government, notwithstanding the attention demanded by its relations with European belligerents, is giving serious consideration to the formulation of an entirely new policy toward the little island republic.

Paul Fuller, Jr., who was sent by President Wilson to Haiti with plenary powers to negotiate a treaty placing the collection of customs duties in that country under the control of the Government, as was done some time ago by the Dominican republic, has submitted a lengthy report which shows that the Haitian government did not want to enter into such a treaty, but made counter proposals, which are not regarded as likely to lead to a settlement of the disturbances on the island.

Officials think the latest revolutionary movement under Dr. Bobo is not strong enough to overthrow the existing government.

President Sam has been recognized by France, Italy and Germany, but the United States is withholding recognition until some arrangement is made with which to stabilize conditions.

The Haitian situation is most threatening at present. French marines have been landed there, and Rear-Admiral Caperton is on his way from Veracruz with 700 bluejackets and marines on the armored cruiser Washington to relieve them and preserve order. The Washington is due to arrive at Cape Haitien next Thursday.

The commission sent recently by President Wilson to Haiti, headed by ex-Governor Fort, it was learned today,

took a pessimistic view of the situation. While they did not specifically recommend armed intervention, the commissioners gave the impression that it was almost hopeless to expect an orderly government to be established without some drastic action by the United States.
