Dugdale Enters Agreement With St. Louis Nationals.

EASTLEY GOES TO MACK

Outfielder Jack Smith to Wear Card Uniform in 1916 and Pitcher Walter Malls Is Sold to Brooklyn Dodgers.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 1.—(Special.)—Big things were doing this afternoon in local baseball circles. The Seattle baseball club, for the first time in its history, entered into a working agreement with a big league organization.

The St. Louis Nationals is the club to which President Dugdale has tied up. The arrangement does not go into effect until next season, but one feature of it already in force gives the St. Louis Cardinals outfielder Jack Smith, who is undoubtedly one of the best prospects in the Northwestern League.

Pitcher Walter Malls was sold to Brooklyn. This was something of a surprise, as Pittsburgh has been after him.

Pitcher Pat Eastley gets his chance to try the big league because President Dugdale was under obligations to Connie Mack, who turned Pitcher Al Gipe over to Seattle.

Several clubs have an eye on Barth, who is now being used as a catcher. That he will be placed with a big league club is a foregone conclusion, but President Dugdale says that he will take time before deciding where he goes.
