Change Said to Be Due When Team Gets Back From Portland, Despite Deal Made by Officials.

KAUFF SUES NEW YORK GIANTS

Crack Brooklyn Fed Demands \$5000 for Signing Contract.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Benny Kauff, the crack outfielder of the Brooklyn Federal, upon hearing that he could not play with the Giants, began a suit in the Supreme Court of Brooklyn today for \$5000 against the National Exhibition Company (owners of the Giants), which amount he averred was promised him when he jumped to the New York Nationals last April.

Kauff says that he was to get \$5000 for signing a three-year contract and that he was not allowed to play, he avers, because he was a naturalized citizen.

The Brooklyn Federals today gave Pitcher Laftie, Cateher Leslie Pratt and Infirio Ward Howard 10-day notices of their release.

GORGONZOLA IS INTERNED

Together With Younger Brother, Not Allowed to Leave City.

NEW YORK, June 27.—The sprightly Gorgonzola, like the aromatic methball, will soon find his place in American museums if the war is not ended soon. A cable message from Italy to A. B. Passaia & Company, cheese importers of 25 River street, Hoboken, announces that the Italian government has placed an embargo on all cheese exportations during the war.

\$3,000,000 PLANT PLAN
